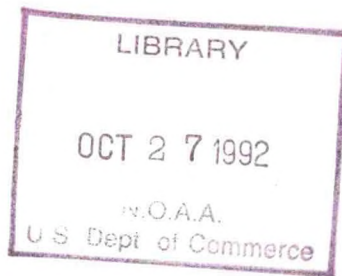

GRADUATION CEREMONIES - 75TH OFFICER TRAINING CLASS

Graduation ceremonies were held for 18 members of the 75th Officer Training Class on 15 December 1983. This class, was the largest to be graduated in recent years and had the privilege of being addressed by Dr. John V. Byrne, Administrator of NOAA. Dr. Byrne congratulated the new officers on joining "one of the best Agencies in the Government" and an officer corps with a "long history of service, and a reputation for excellence." He spoke of the differences between officers entering the Corps today, and those entering at the formation of the C&GS Commissioned Corps, 66 years ago. In spite of changes that have taken place since then, Dr. Byrne pointed out that commissioned officers have maintained two important qualities that give them a special place in the Agency; quick mobility and a certain type of discipline which is inherent with the responsibility of command.

In closing, Dr. Byrne advised class members that they could look forward to times of both fun and frustration, and wished them "fair winds, following seas, and paychecks received on time."

Postscript: At an informal awards ceremony during the luncheon following graduation, the class presented Dr. Byrne with an application to the NOAA Corps.

SPECIAL RECOGNITION

Lieutenant Nicholas E. Perugini, one of our NOAA Corps officers engaged in full-time graduate studies at the Naval Postgraduate School, is congratulated for making the Dean's List for the summer academic quarter with a 3.74 average in Hydrographic Sciences.

NAVAL POSTGRADUATE SCHOOL

As mentioned in last month's BULLETIN, Lieutenant Waltz also received the Master of Science degree in Hydrographic Sciences. The abstract from Lt. Waltz's thesis "An Error Analysis of Range-Azimuth Positioning" is as follows:

ABSTRACT

Pointing error standard deviations for two theodolites, the Wild T-2 and Odom Aztrac, were determined under conditions closely approximating those of range-azimuth or azimuth-azimuth hydrographic surveys. Pointing errors found for both instruments were about 1.3 meters, and were independent of distance. No statistical difference between the errors of the two instruments was found. The accuracy of the interpolation methods used by the National Ocean Service (NOS) for range-azimuth positioning were investigated, and an average inverse distance of about 2.5 meters was observed between interpolated positions and corresponding observed positions. The overall range-azimuth position errors of the two theodolite were then compared to positioning standards of NOS and the International Hydrographic Organization, using assumed ranging standard deviations of 1.0 and 3.0 meters. Both instruments met all standards except the NOS range-azimuth standard for 1:5,000 scale surveys. Interpolated positions may fail to meet more of the standards because of additional inherent error.

FROM THE CHAIRMAN, FULL-TIME UNIVERSITY TRAINING (FUT) BOARD

At its recent annual meeting, the FUT Board reviewed 15 applicants for advanced schooling and selected five for recommendation to The Director, NOAA Corps, to begin full-time university training at colleges and Service schools during 1984. Several others were recommended for enrollment during the out-years 1985 and 1986, generally due to assignment considerations. A letter explaining each applicant's status on a case-by-case basis will be forthcoming during early 1984 following the Director's review. Final announcement about confirmation of advanced education plans for the 1984 candidates is contingent upon clearance by the Administrator early in 1984.

We observed at this year's annual meeting, a paucity of strong sponsorship of deserving candidates for certain needed types of advanced schooling. A number of officers appeared to be "promoting their own programs" which were not necessarily always validated as being in the best interest of NOAA and/or the Corps. We also noted that many Service Reports (SF 56-25) include statements of interest in full-time university training but these were not necessarily followed up by formal requests in accordance with NDM 56-77. Marine Center Directors, Commanding Officers, and Supervisors are urged to recommend deserving officers for advanced academic training when deemed appropriate. A future meeting of the FUT Board will address this matter in further depth and more specific guidelines relating to this process will be discussed in a future BULLETIN article.

FITNESS REPORT REMINDER

CHAMPUS NEWS

October Started Your Deductible Again - Don't forget that on Oct. 1, your CHAMPUS deductible for outpatient care started for the year. That's another way of saying that, from Oct. 1 of this year through the end of September next year, you pay the first \$50 (for an individual) or the first \$100 (for a family) worth of allowable outpatient medical bills.

Send in your claims as you normally do, and the CHAMPUS claims processor will keep track until your deductible is met for the year. Also, if you have other insurance that picks up your outpatient bills, send in their statement showing how much they paid. That counts toward your deductible, too.

How to Get Better Service on CHAMPUS Toll-Free Phones - Before you call your CHAMPUS claims processor, be prepared. Have ready: (1) Sponsor's Social Security Number or VA File Number; (2) Names of the patient and the health care provider; (3) Dates of care and amount of the bill; (4) Claim number, if available, and the date you sent in the bill.

You'll also find it easiest to get through during less-busy times. Call late in the mornings or mid-afternoons (in the claims processor's time zone) on Tuesday, Wednesday or Thursday.

Your Health Benefits Information Wallet Card--Next time you get a new service ID card, they may also give you a card to keep in your wallet that explains how to use your health benefits. The wallet card has room to write important medical phone numbers, such as the nearest Health Benefits Advisor (HBA) and your CHAMPUS claims processor. The card is just for your convenience--not identification or any official use! You can also obtain wallet cards from any HBA.

HBAs of the Year--If you think your Health Benefits Advisor (HBA) deserves special recognition, contact the HBA's commander. Each service will soon select its "HBA of the Year" for 1984, an award for outstanding service in helping military families use their health benefits.

SPECIAL RECOGNITION

TRAINING AND ITS IMPORTANCE TO YOU

Training is a means of improving performance productivity. Some of the reasons for utilizing training opportunities are to improve present performance; to reach your full potential; to accommodate to changing technology, reorganization, changing missions, and equipment changes; to keep abreast of the "state of the art" in science, engineering, and other highly complex assignments; and to equip yourself with the skill and knowledge necessary to perform certain functions which are unique to the NOAA Corps as well as the Government.

The following are some questions and answers on training that may be of interest to those of you contemplating training now or in the future.

Q - Can I take college courses leading to an academic degree at Government expense?

A - You cannot be given training through non-Government facilities in order to qualify you for appointment to a particular position for which a degree is a basic requirement. Nor can you be given non-Government training for the sole purpose of earning a degree. However, your agency may finance job-related courses in non-Government facilities for the purpose of improving your performance. If you receive an academic degree as a consequence of such training, it is considered as a by-product.

Q - Can my normal working hours be readjusted so that I can take courses at my own expense?

A - Your customary workweek may be rescheduled to allow you to take courses not sponsored by NOAA if:

- a. additional costs to NOAA will not be incurred;
- b. completion of the course will better equip you for accomplishing the mission of the NOAA Corps; and
- c. there will not be appreciable interruption of work.

Q - What training expenses can NOAA pay?

A - Payment for training authorized by NOAA may include tuition, matriculation fees, library and laboratory services, purchase or rental of books, materials, supplies, and other services directly related to the authorized training program. (The purchase of reference books or selected reading materials are not authorized).

Officers may claim reimbursement for local travel for courses of 15 continuous working days or less if the courses are attended during duty hours.

Officers may not claim reimbursement for local travel fees for classes held on a weekly basis which continue over 10 working days (i.e., credit or noncredit courses at colleges and universities) or attendance at courses held during off-duty hours.

Officers selected for full-time, long-term training at an educational facility beyond their commuting distance are entitled to transportation of family and shipment of household goods and personal effects when these would be less than per diem payments for the period of training.

- Q - If I do not satisfactorily complete a non-Government training course funded by NOAA, do I have to pay back all or part of the course costs?
- A - If any officer fails to pass or complete any training assignments, NOAA must determine if the costs should be reimbursed by the officer. When officers are not required to reimburse the training costs, they may not receive NOAA support for the same course at any time in the future.
- Q - Is the training which I receive recorded in my Official Personnel File?
- A - Yes. NOAA Corps procedures provide that formal training sponsored by the Government is recorded in your official personnel file and you receive a copy of confirmation. You should assure yourself, however, that significant training, whether sponsored by NOAA or taken on your own, is recorded in your personnel file. These records assist in developing training plans and goals, determining further training needs, may have a bearing on promotions, and are taken into consideration in the assignment process.
- Q - What is a continued service agreement?
- A - When you are assigned to training in non-Government facilities which exceeds 80 hours within a single program, you must sign an agreement to continue in your agency's employ for at least three times the length of the training. The period of obligated service begins upon the completion of training. For example, if you attend non-Government training full-time for 16 weeks you would be obligated to a minimum of 48 weeks of service.
- Q - What happens if my employment is terminated before I complete the service required by my agreement?
- A - If you voluntarily leave the Government, you have an obligation to repay the amount of expenses (other than pay) incurred by the Government in training you.
- Q - What factors are considered in selections?
- A - During the selection process considerations are made regardless of age, race, color, religion, sex, national origin, or other factors not related to the need for training. Following are a number of factors which are used as selection criteria:
- a. Record of performance to date.
 - b. Generally, at least 2 sea tours (except for Service Schools).
 - c. Indication of training toward long-term career objective (NOAA Mission).
 - d. Initiative shown in meeting career objectives. (i.e., taking courses on own).

TRAINING ASSISTANCE - VETERANS ADMINISTRATION

Officers commissioned prior to January 1, 1977, are entitled to the old "G.I. Bill" for 10 years after their retirement or separation date. This program's expiration date is December 31, 1989. Eligibility requirements are as follows:

- o entered service prior to January 1, 1977
- o served 181 or more continuous days after January 31, 1955 (or discharged for a service-connected disability prior to completion of 180 days)
- o on active duty or, if not, discharged under conditions other than dishonorable

Any officer entitled to this program, and who plans to use it, should be aware that the entitlement will expire on December 31, 1989, whether the program has or has not been used. [38 USC 34]

The Veterans Administration also provides a program of financial assistance for the education and training of eligible participants under the Post-Vietnam Era Veterans' Assistance Program (VEAP). The program is designed to encourage self-improvement and offers financial help to such participants in raising their educational level. It is equally applicable to both active duty and discharged or retired officers who meet certain criteria. Common to both groups are the following:

- o entered active duty after December 31, 1976
- o at least 3 months of contributions are available
- o served for a continuous period of 181 days or more

Present interpretation by Veterans Administration for active duty NOAA Corps officers further requires at least 6 years of service before VEAP can be utilized. Discharged or retired officers who entered on active duty after October 16, 1981, must have completed 24 continuous months of active duty for entitlement to utilize VEAP. [38 USC 32]

Otherwise, you may to consult your local telephone directory under U.S. Government, Veterans Administration, for the number to reach a VA representative. Toll-free telephone service is available in all 50 states.

NOTES FROM THE TRAINING CENTER

The December issue of the U.S.C.G. "Proceedings of the Marine Safety Council" contains an article entitled "Watchkeeping," which should be of interest to all officers. It contains excerpts from the International Convention on Standards of Training, Certification and Watchkeeping for Seafarers, 1978. The article focuses on basic principles and operational guidelines for officers in charge of a navigational watch underway. Although the U.S. has not yet ratified the convention, the regulations set forth have been ratified by many foreign nations, and are the basis for the proposed new U.S. licensing

structure. The concise and informative way in which the regulations and recommendations are outlined make them of value to watch standers, and an excellent basis for any ship's standing orders. Future articles will address watchkeeping for deck officers in port, and engineers underway and in port.

CHAMPUS NEWS

Inpatient Cost-Share Went Up Jan. 1--Effective Jan. 1, 1984, the daily amount active-duty families pay for inpatient care in civilian hospitals under CHAMPUS went up from \$6.55 to \$6.80.

This means that, for every day an active-duty family member spends as a patient in a civilian hospital under CHAMPUS, he or she will pay \$6.80--or a total of \$25, whichever is greater.

Military retirees and their families (and survivors of deceased active or retired military personnel) pay 25 percent of the cost of covered care in a civilian hospital. CHAMPUS pays 75 percent of the allowed charges for covered hospital and doctor bills.

When Do You Need A Nonavailability Statement--You need a nonavailability statement (NAS) when you live within the zip code area surrounding a military hospital, but the nonemergency inpatient care you need isn't available there. The hospital's Health Benefits Advisor issues the NAS and you would then seek care from civilian sources.

After you receive the care you need from the civilian source, be sure the NAS is attached to the claim that's filed with your state's CHAMPUS claims processor. You don't need an NAS for outpatient care--except in the areas around three test sites: Fort Ord and Vandenberg Air Force Base, Calif., and the Naval Regional Medical Center, Pensacola, Fla. The use of non-availability statements for outpatient care is being tested in those locations.

Ohio and West Virginia: Send Claims to Rhode Island--Service families who live in Ohio and West Virginia should remember to send their CHAMPUS claims to Blue Cross and Blue Shield of Rhode Island for processing. Some folks in those states have apparently been continuing to send their claims to the previous claims processor--not realizing that Blue Cross and Blue Shield of Rhode Island took over the CHAMPUS claims processing function for those two, and a number of other states, on Oct. 1, 1983.

The Rhode Island firm now processes CHAMPUS claims for 17 states: Connecticut, Illinois, Indiana, Iowa, Kentucky, Maine, Massachusetts, Michigan, Minnesota, New Hampshire, New Jersey, New York, Rhode Island, Vermont, Wisconsin--and Ohio and West Virginia. They also handle Christian Science claims for CHAMPUS.

IN MEMORIAM

REAR ADMIRAL WILLIAM M. GIBSON, NOAA (RET.)
10/08/01 - 11/27/83

Rear Admiral William Murel Gibson was born October 8, 1901, in Ft. Collins, Colorado. He attended Colorado State College where he received a Bachelor of Science Degree in Civil and Irrigation Engineering on June 5, 1924.

Following his graduation, he was appointed as a Deck Officer on September 1, 1924, and was commissioned as an Ensign on August 8, 1925. During his 33 year career his duties included being assigned aboard the LYDONIA, the MARINDUQUE, and the PATHFINDER, OCEANOGRAPHER, and PIONEER as Executive Officer, and the HYDROGRAPHER and BOWIE as Commanding Officer. His other assignments included various Geodesy and Triangulations Parties, many of which he served as Chief of Party. He served as Assistant Chief in the Geophysics Division and at the time of his retirement was serving as Supervisor of the Western District Office in San Francisco.

During World War II Admiral Gibson was transferred to the Navy from March 16, 1942, until September 30, 1946. He was given temporary promotions to commander and captain. He was awarded the Bronze Star Medal by the Commander South Pacific Area and South Pacific Force with the following citation:

"For meritorious service as Executive Officer on a hydrographic survey vessel operating in the South Pacific Area from June 1942 to May 1944. During this period Commander Gibson was responsible for the preparation of a large number of valuable charts of the waters in this area. He conducted numerous surveys in and planned the charts of the waters surrounding the British Solomon Islands. These were the first complete and accurate charts of these waters, and were of inestimable value to the many naval commands in planning and carrying operations against the Japanese. On several occasions he made rough surveys at night by motor torpedo boats in close proximity to enemy held islands in order to obtain accurate data. His conduct and devotion to duty contributed materially to the success of our forces in this area and were in keeping with the highest traditions of the United States Naval Service."

Based on his Bronze Star Medal, Admiral Gibson was given an honorary advancement to Rear Admiral effective 1 March 1958 when he retired.

He is survived by his wife, the former Margaret A. Darr, and one son, William E. Gibson.

LIEUTENANT DUANE C. SIMPSON, NOAA (RET.)
September 23, 1948 - January 19, 1983

Lieutenant Duane Carter Simpson was born September 23, 1948, at Pueblo, Colorado. He attended the Colorado School of Mines where he graduated in May 1971 with a Bachelor of Science degree in Geophysics. Later, while in the NOAA Corps, he received a Master of Science degree in Engineering Administration from George Washington University.

Lieutenant Simpson served in the United States Army as a commissioned officer from July 29, 1971; until he was appointed to the NOAA Corps as a lieutenant (junior grade) on September 2, 1975. Assignments following his appointment included serving as junior officer aboard the NOAA Ship DISCOVERER and headquarters duty as follows: Marine Surveys and Maps, Ocean Dumping Program; Office of Oceanography, Associate Director's Office and Ocean Dumping and Monitoring Division, Near-Shore Ocean Dumping; Office of the Administrator, NOAA Executive Secretariat; and finally at the time of his retirement, the Office of the NOAA Corps, Commissioned Personnel Division.

He was awarded the NOAA Association of Commissioned Officers' Junior Officer of the Year Award for 1978. He was also given a Certificate of Recognition with cash award for his "valuable contribution to further understanding of the impact of open ocean disposal of dredge material at the Norfolk disposal site" in 1981.

Lieutenant Simpson is survived by his spouse, the former Rose Marie Book and their two sons, Curtis and Michael.

FROM THE DIRECTOR'S DESK

We have spoken in recent times of the need for professional development both from the Office of the NOAA Corps and through the Association of Commissioned Officers. The continued striving for fulfillment and professional excellence is illustrated by Rear Admiral Robert W. Knox, (Ret.), who has just been granted his 10th renewal of his master mariners license; item number 11.3 . . . one third mate, one chief mate and eleven masters.

For those officers not acquainted with Rear Admiral Knox, he retired as Assistant Director of the Coast and Geodetic Survey in 1957, after 36 years of service. This was followed by 5 years as President of the Directing Committee, International Hydrographic Bureau in Monte Carlo.

Following his attendance at grammar and high schools in Montana, he graduated from the University of Washington in 1923 with a degree in civil engineering and was commissioned as ensign during that year. MONETARY ALLOWANCE IN LIEU OF TRANSPORTATION WHILE ON TEMPORARY DUTY

Before 1 March 1984, passengers in privately-owned vehicles, who were not responsible for the cost of operation of the vehicle while on temporary duty, were entitled to \$0.16 per mile (MALT) for the distance of the ordered travel. As of 1 March 1984, this entitlement will be removed from para M4203-4a of the Joint Travel Regulation Vol. 1. Thereafter, uniformed services personnel who ride in privately-owned vehicles as passengers while on temporary duty and are not responsible for the operating expenses of the vehicle will no longer be entitled to the \$0.16 per mile (MALT).

VETERANS ADMINISTRATION NEWS

Question - My husband was covered under Veterans' Group Life Insurance when he died. An attorney from a company where he owed money said they would attach the proceeds of the insurance to pay the bill. Can they do this?

Answer - No. Servicemen's Group Life Insurance and Veterans' Group Life Insurance proceeds are not assignable, nor are payments to beneficiaries subject to claims of creditors of the insured or beneficiary.

Question - Can a veteran draw compensation even though his or her disabilities are service-connected but rated as noncompensable?

Answer - Yes. When a veteran has two or more noncompensable service-connected disabilities that are permanent and clearly interfere with normal employability, a 10 percent rating may be assigned.

CHAMPUS

CHAMPUS Proposes Telephone Pacemaker Monitoring - A proposed CHAMPUS rule change would allow heart patients to have their pacemakers monitored by telephone, with CHAMPUS sharing the cost of the service. Monitoring pacemakers by telephone would permit doctors to find out whether a pacemaker is working properly and would help CHAMPUS patients by saving unnecessary trips to a doctor's office.

No "Cap" on the Cost-Share - In response to the question asked by a military retiree the other day - no, there is no "cap", or upper limit, on the amount of the cost-share you pay when getting care under CHAMPUS.

For example, if you (as a military retiree) need medical care covered by CHAMPUS that will cost \$20,000, your share of that will be \$5,000 (or 25 percent) with CHAMPUS picking up the rest.

The cost-share can be burdensome, but some military associations offer "CHAMPUS supplemental" insurance policies. These policies pay your cost-share for covered care, after CHAMPUS has paid its 75 percent of a retiree family's share of the cost of inpatient or outpatient care. Coverages and premiums vary among policies, so choose the one that is best for your needs.

The family of an active-duty service member pays 20 percent of the cost of covered outpatient care under CHAMPUS. Inpatient care costs them \$6.80 per day, or a total of \$25, whichever is greater. Both active-duty families, and retirees and their families, pay the first \$50 in a fiscal year (the first \$100 for the whole family) for outpatient care, before CHAMPUS cost-sharing starts.

Checking on a Claim? Have this Information Handy -- If you need to check on a CHAMPUS claim--either with your state's claims processor, with CHAMPUS headquarters, or with your local Health Benefits Advisor--it will speed the checking process considerably if you have the following information at your fingertips: patient's full name; sponsor's full name, rank, branch of service and status (active or retired); sponsor's Social Security Number; sponsor's and patient's addresses and telephone numbers; name and address of whoever provided the care; and dates of the care.

CHAMPUS OMBUDSMAN READY TO HELP - Having trouble getting help or answers about CHAMPUS benefits?

If you've already talked to your local Health Benefits Advisor and to your state's claims processor, and haven't received the assistance necessary, maybe it's time to write to the CHAMPUS Ombudsman. He is Air Force Senior Master Sgt. Walt Kane, an advocate for CHAMPUS families who need extra help with a problem.

The Ombudsman is not a replacement for the regional CHAMPUS claims processors or the Health Benefits Advisors at the various military activities. M/Sgt. Kane only wants to hear those exceptional cases that have gone through all other avenues of assistance. So, if everything else has failed and you need the Ombudsman's help, write to: OCHAMPUS/DO (Ombudsman), Aurora, CO 80045.

DEERS DOES NOT "REPLACE" CHAMPUS--Word from the field has it that some military families think DEERS is "replacing" CHAMPUS as a part of their health benefits package. The fact is, DEERS is not replacing CHAMPUS.

DEERS is the Defense Enrollment Eligibility Reporting System. It's a nationwide computerized data bank that is being used to make sure active and retired military people and their families (and the survivors of deceased active and retired military) are eligible to receive health care and other benefits.

Military members--both active and retired--and their families must be enrolled in DEERS. Why? Because DEERS is being used to protect the military health benefits package against use by persons who aren't eligible. This checking of eligibility is expected to save millions of dollars each year in health care funds--it protects service families, other taxpayers, and the government.

There's another advantage for families who are signed up with DEERS: Their CHAMPUS claims can be paid quickly and without delay (assuming the claims are complete and correctly filled out when submitted).

FROM THE DIRECTOR'S DESK

The Year of the Ocean was kicked off on March 9 and 10, 1984, with an open house at both the Washington Navy Yard and at Andrews Air Force Base. The RESEARCHER, under the Command of Captain Donald J. Florwick, was open for visitation for 2 days at the Navy Yard. The NOAA Corps was well represented by the RESEARCHER'S wardroom, in addition to support from officers from both the Washington and Norfolk areas.

While the public viewed the RESEARCHER, NOAA displays and aircraft at Andrews Air Force Base were also on the agenda for the day. The Corps gained visibility at our recruiting booth, in addition to exposure from officers at other NOAA displays--the P-3 aircraft and the UH-IM helicopter.

A major aim of the Year of the Ocean is to reawaken the country's consciousness to its bond to the sea. Ocean-oriented organizations have scheduled a series of events throughout the Nation, and the NOAA Corps is encouraged to participate at every opportunity.

SPECIAL RECOGNITION

Commander John K. Callahan was presented a Certificate of Recognition with Cash Award by the Administrator, NOAA, for his individual and group efforts in acting upon a backlog of 138 cases and establishing procedures and policy for collection of unpaid civil penalties while assigned to the Office of General Counsel.

The Commanding Officer, Officers and Crew of the NOAA Ship PEIRCE received a Letter of Appreciation from J. Philip Keillor, P.E., Coastal Engineer, University of Wisconsin-Madison. They were commended for their contributions in compiling the Bottom Texture Tracing Map compiled last year. The map itself is sufficient evidence of the effort expended by the PEIRCE to support this cooperative program with the Sea Grant Institute of the University of Wisconsin-Madison. A "well done" was passed along to the ship.

The Commanding Officer, Officers and Crew of the NOAA Ship RAINIER received a Letter of Commendation from R. J. Brown Associates, Houston, Texas, for a job "well done" in support of the recent marine survey conducted off Kahe Point, Oahu, which contributed immensely to the Phase II preliminary design of the 40 mWe OTEC pilot plant sponsored by the U.S. Department of Energy.

FROM THE DIRECTOR'S DESK

The Administrator has approved the reassignment of Rear Admiral Charles K. Townsend to the position of Director, Office of Marine Operations, NOS, effective this fall.

The Administrator also approved the selection of Captain Robert L. Sandquist as the next Director, Pacific Marine Center, NOS, with the promotion to Rear Admiral (Lower Half) effective 1 August 1984.

Both Admiral Townsend and Captain Sandquist have my personal and official congratulations and best wishes on their selection for these key billets. New exciting challenges and changes of the times will provide many opportunities to move forward into the future.

LIEUTENANT COMMANDER KENNETH E. HOLDEN received the Naval Sea Systems Command Award in Naval Engineering, in recognition of distinguished academic achievement in the Naval Engineering Program, during graduation exercises at the Naval Postgraduate School in Monterey, California, on 30 March 1984. The criteria for the award included demonstrated academic excellence measured by marks attained, content of thesis, and demonstrated leadership potential in Naval Engineering. In addition, he received a Letter of Commendation from Paul J. Marto, Chairman, Department of Mechanical Engineering, for his fine thesis work. His thesis has been condensed into a technical paper which he will present at the Winter Annual Meeting of the American Society of Mechanical Engineers at New Orleans in December 1984. An abstract of his thesis will appear in a subsequent issue of the BULLETIN.

QRMC UPDATE

Since 1967, the President of the United States has been required by law to conduct a complete review every four years of the principles and concepts of the compensation system for members of the uniformed services. For the 1983 review, the President delegated the responsibility to the Secretary of Defense who assigned the task to Dr. Lawrence J. Korb, Assistant Secretary of Defense (Manpower Reserve Affairs, and Logistics). The Fifth Quadrennial Review of Military Compensation (QRMC) began in the fall of 1982 and has recently been completed. All seven uniformed services participated. Rear Admiral K. E. Taggart was the NOAA Corps Principal Participant with Captain Charles A. Burroughs as Alternate. Among NOAA components that made important contributions to the Fifth QRMC were the NOAA Diving Program, Office of Aircraft Operations, and the Atlantic and Pacific Marine Centers.

The Fifth QRMC primarily examined the military retirement system with its associated benefits, the survivor benefits program and the special incentive pay system. The findings and recommendations of the QRMC have recently been published. QRMC recommendations that represent changes in the current pay systems or retirement benefits will require legislation prior to implementation. The remainder of this article briefly describes special pay recommendations of particular interest to the NOAA Corps. Future issues of the BULLETIN will examine the QRMC's recommendations on the military retirement system.

Special Pay

1. Career Sea Pay

- a. Career Sea Pay (CSP) provides special compensation to personnel serving on sea duty in recognition of the unusually arduous nature of such duty and as a means of improving retention of personnel in sea service skills.
- b. Under current law, officers in pay grades 0-1 and 0-2 with at least four years of active service as enlisted members or as non-commissioned warrant officers are entitled to receive Career Sea Pay (CSP), if they have accrued three years of creditable sea duty. The QRMCM recommended that officers at 0-1 and 0-2 should be eligible for CSP after accruing three years of creditable sea service (if eligible by assignment) irrespective of the four years active service requirement.
- c. Under current law, maximum CSP rates are reached after twelve (12) years of sea duty. The QRMCM recommended that incremental rates beyond twelve (12) years through twenty (20) years should be established with a higher maximum.
- d. Officers at 0-7 and above would continue to receive no CSP.

2. Diving Pay

- a. Diving Duty Pay is designed to increase the ability of the Uniformed Services to attract and retain sufficient volunteers to perform the arduous and hazardous duties involved with diving.
- b. The QRMCM found that there is a need for Diving Duty Pay now and in the future.
- c. The QRMCM recommended that a review of current Diving Duty Pay rates be conducted after July 1984.
- d. Current Diving Pay legislation restricts divers to receiving only one (1) Hazardous Duty Incentive Pay in addition to Diving Duty Pay. The QRMCM recommended amending the legislation to allow for two (2) additional pays.

3. Aviation Career Incentive Pay

- a. Aviation Career Incentive Pay (ACIP) is designed to provide additional pay for aviation service so as to increase the ability of the Uniformed Services to attract and retain officer volunteers in an aviation career.
- b. The QRMCM found ACIP necessary to attract and retain career aviators.

- c. The QRMCM found ACIP current rates to be sufficient to maintain needed inventory through Fiscal Year 1987 (FY 87). However, the QRMCM also noted that the current rates may not be able to prevent serious losses when airlines begin to hire pilots in significant numbers (expected to happen no later than 1990). The QRMCM recommended that ACIP rates be reevaluated no later than the end of FY 86.

4. Special Pay While on Duty at Certain Places (CPP)

- a. Special Pay While on Duty at Certain Places (CPP) was initially designed to act as an incentive or additional compensation for duty overseas involving truly arduous assignments. However, rates have not changed in many years, reducing CPP to a token payment. Officers are currently not eligible to receive CPP.
- b. CPP is presently authorized for enlisted personnel of the Uniformed Services serving unaccompanied tours and has been liberalized to include enlisted personnel serving where the with-dependents tour length is less than three years.
- c. The QRMCM recommended that CPP be extended to officers.
- d. The QRMCM found that the eligibility criteria are too lenient and recommended that CPP be authorized only when accompaniment of dependents is not authorized. A provision would allow for waivers on a case-by-case basis by the individual Service Secretaries.
- e. The QRMCM found that there were too many authorized locations. Currently authorized locations that are highly questionable in terms of arduous duty include Singapore, all of Alaska (instead of certain areas), all of Thailand (instead of certain areas), etc. The QRMCM recommended that CPP be authorized only when, in addition to the provision in (d.) above, one of the following conditions exists:
 - (1) Complete isolation by normal road or rail travel from populated areas;
 - (2) Seasonal limitations on air or ship travel; or
 - (3) Extreme weather.

Family Separation Allowance (Type II)

- a. The only Allowance as opposed to Special or Incentive Pay examined by the QRMCM was Family Separation Allowance (Type II), also referred to as FSA II. FSA II is designed to reimburse miscellaneous expenses that result from family separation. FSA II is paid to officers with dependents who:
 - (1) are serving unaccompanied Permanent Change of Station (PCS) tours, or
 - (2) are deployed at sea away from homeport for 30 continuous days, or

- (3) are serving at a temporary duty station for a continuous period of more than thirty (30) days when the dependents do not reside in the area of the temporary duty station.
- b. The QRMC recommended that FSA II be retained and the monthly rate be increased to \$60 (currently \$30).

Again, all of the above recommendations that represent changes to current pay practices will require new legislation to become effective.

IN MEMORIAM

CAPTAIN OLIVER SCOTT READING

August 2, 1894 - April 10, 1984

Captain Oliver S. Reading was born at West Falls, New York, and was graduated from Lane Technical High School in Chicago, Illinois. He entered on duty with the U.S. Coast and Geodetic Survey on July 1, 1915, and became one of the original members of the USC&GS commissioned service, predecessor of the NOAA Corps. At the time of his retirement on September 1, 1954, Captain Reading was Chief of Photogrammetry, Coast and Geodetic Survey.

Captain Reading's early field assignments with the USC&GS included hydrographic and geodetic surveying along the coasts of the United States and throughout the Philippine Islands. His sea service was continuous from 1915 to 1928. Following this he went on to gain international recognition as an expert in the field of photogrammetry and was a pioneer in instrument development for this purpose. Among his major achievements was the invention of a special 9-lens aerial camera, principally for surveys in Alaska. He played a major role in coordinating aerial photogrammetric procedures into the charting activities of the Coast and Geodetic Survey. As a result of his valuable contributions to science, he was awarded the 1947 Department of Commerce Silver Medal for Meritorious Service.

Captain Reading was one of the principal organizers of the American Society of Photogrammetry. He served as Chairman of the American Delegation to the Fifth International Congress on Photogrammetry and the Sixth International Congress of Surveyors in Rome during 1938. He wrote numerous papers dealing with photogrammetry. He held membership in many scientific and technical organizations including being a member of the council of the International Society of Photogrammetry and was an honorary life member of both the International and the American Societies of Photogrammetry.

He is survived by his wife of sixty years, the former Martha C. Gothard, and two children, a daughter, Martha R. Luria and a son, Dr. George P. Reading.

NAVAL POSTGRADUATE SCHOOL

In last month's BULLETIN, Lieutenant Commander Kenneth M. Holden was cited for distinguished academic achievement at Naval Postgraduate School. The abstract from his thesis "An Evaluation of Polymer Coatings for the Promotion of Dropwise Condensation of Steam" is as follows:

ABSTRACT

Fourteen polymer coatings were evaluated for their ability to promote and sustain dropwise condensation of steam. Nine of the coatings employed a flouropolymer as a major constituent; five employed hydrocarbons and one a silicone. Each coating was applied to 25 mm square by approximately 1 mm thick metal substrates of brass, copper, naval brass, and titanium. While exposed to steam at atmospheric pressure, each coating was visually evaluated for its ability to promote dropwise condensation. Observations were conducted over a period of 4000 hours. Hardness and adhesion tests were performed on selected specimens both before and after exposure.

On the basis of sustained performance, six coatings were selected for heat-transfer performance evaluation. A separate apparatus was used in which 19 mm diameter, coated copper tubes were mounted horizontally in a test section through which steam flowed vertically downward. Vapor-side heat-transfer coefficients were inferred from overall measurements. Test results indicate that the outside condensing coefficient can be increased by a factor of five to eight through the use of polymer coatings to promote dropwise condensation.

SERVICEMEN'S GROUP LIFE INSURANCE

Effective July 1, 1984, the rates for the Servicemen's Group Life Insurance will be reduced for all active-duty personnel currently covered. The premiums are being reduced from \$.116 to \$.08 per \$1,000 of coverage.

The rate reduction is a result of increased interest earnings and a continuing favorable mortality experience, which increased the program's contingency reserve over the past several years. In order to reduce the contingency reserve, rates have been reduced below the "break-even" rate. Therefore, premium increases will be needed in the future as experience warrants.

Beginning July 1, 1984, the following amounts will be deducted per month from your pay:

STATE OF MARYLAND BILL SIGNING

On 15 May 1984, the Governor of Maryland signed into law Senate bill 408 entitled: "An Act concerning Veterans - Definition: For the purpose of including members of certain uniformed services in the definition of 'veteran' for the purpose of certain State programs." Under Article 1 - Rules of Interpretation, the bill reads: "With respect to any State program of benefits, rights, or privileges applicable to a veteran under this code, the term 'veteran' includes members of the Commissioned Corps of the Public Health Service and the Commissioned Corps of the National Oceanic and Atmospheric Administration (or its predecessor, the Coast and Geodetic Survey) if eligible under Section 101, Title 38 of the U.S. Code."

Representing the NOAA Corps at the signing ceremony at the Maryland State House in Annapolis were Rear Admiral K. E. Taggart, Captain Charles Burroughs, Commander John Callahan, Commander Robert Smart and Lieutenant John Clary. This day was the culmination of a number of years of concerted effort by many Corps officers, particularly Captain William E. Randall, NOAA (Retired) who has pushed for this legislation in our behalf through his affiliation with The Retired Officers Association (TROA). We are also especially indebted to the hard work in our behalf exhibited by Captain Ned Dolan, USMC (Retired) in his capacity as Legislative Chairman for the Maryland Chapter of TROA, and Captain Francis X. Popper, NOAA (Retired) who testified before the Maryland General Assembly in behalf of the bill.

A number of principal benefits derived through the passage of this bill, which will become effective 1 July 1984, follow:

- o Burial in a Maryland Veteran's Cemetery.
- o Property tax exemption for 100 percent VA certified disability.
- o Auto tag exemption for certain disabilities (mobility handicapped).
- o Credit for service for employment, priority in hiring, and reinstatement rights in the state government.
- o Credit for service for merit employment in the subdivision of the State (county and city governments).
- o Free copies of records held by various level court clerks for use in prosecuting claims against the U.S. Government, whether they need to be certified or not.
- o Free certifications of birth, marriage, divorce and death of the veteran and immediate family members.
- o Educational aid for war orphans, i.e., children whose parent died in service or as the result of a service-connected disability.
- o Eligibility for admission to the Maryland Veterans' Home.

VA GUARANTEED HOME LOANS--CHANGED

It may become harder for veterans to get VA-guaranteed home loans if the VA changes the way it pays off lenders when homeowners default on their mortgage payments.

Currently, when veterans become subject to foreclosures, the VA acquires deed to the property by paying off the full amount of the mortgage. The VA then refurbishes and sells the property, theoretically either breaking even on the resale or making a profit.

Because the VA holds out for a maximum selling price when reselling these homes, it often holds on to them for many months, frequently even allowing the defaulting veteran to remain in residence until the resale is completed. Because it does so, the VA actually averages a loss of several thousand dollars in such repossessions and resales.

Now the administration's proposed Fiscal Year 1985 budget has incorporated a recommendation by the President's Private Sector Survey on Cost Control that the VA be permitted only to pay off the amount guaranteed to the lender, not the whole amount of the mortgage. VA Administrator Harry N. Walters has indicated that the agency will wait at least until this fall to begin implementing the proposal--if then.

In the interim, Walters said, the VA will study the new proposal to see how its adoption might affect veterans getting any type of mortgage assistance.

INPATIENT CHAMPUS COST-SHARE

Effective January 1, 1984, the daily amount active-duty families pay for inpatient care in civilian hospitals under CHAMPUS went up from \$6.55 to \$6.80.

This means that an active-duty family member, as a patient in a civilian hospital under CHAMPUS, will pay \$6.80 per day, or a total of \$25, whichever is greater.

Military retirees and their families (and survivors of deceased active or retired military personnel) pay 25 percent of the cost of covered care in a civilian hospital. CHAMPUS pays 75 percent of the allowed charges for covered hospital and doctor bills.

NO CAP ON THE COST-SHARE UNDER CHAMPUS

There is no cap, or upper limit, on the amount of the cost-share you pay when getting care under CHAMPUS. For example, if you (as a military retiree) need medical care covered by CHAMPUS that will cost \$20,000, your share of that will be \$5,000, (or 25 percent with CHAMPUS picking up the rest).

The cost-share can be a burden, but some military associations offer CHAMPUS supplemental insurance policies. These policies pay your cost-share for covered care, after CHAMPUS has paid its 75 percent of a retiree's family's share of the cost of inpatient or outpatient care. Coverages and premiums vary among policies, so choose the one that best suits your needs.

The family of an active-duty service member pays 20 percent of the cost of covered outpatient care under CHAMPUS. Inpatient care costs them \$6.80 per day, or a total of \$25, whichever is greater. Both active-duty families and retirees and their families pay the first \$50 in a fiscal year (the first \$100 for the whole family) for outpatient care, before CHAMPUS cost-sharing starts.

IN MEMORIAM

CAPTAIN EMIL HERMAN KIRSCH

OCTOBER 30, 1900 - MAY 17, 1984

Captain Emil H. Kirsch was born October 30, 1900, in Chamberlain, South Dakota. He attended the University of Minnesota and later graduated from South Dakota State School of Mines and Technology in June 1924 with a Bachelor of Science degree in Civil Engineering. Captain Kirsch was appointed as a Deck Officer on July 11, 1925, and was commissioned as an ensign on March 26, 1926.

During his 33-year career, Captain Kirsch had various sea assignments that included serving aboard the following ships: SURVEYOR, PATHFINDER, HYDROGRAPHER as Accounting Officer, GUIDE as Accounting Officer, DERICKSON as Executive Officer, EXPLORER as Navigating Officer and later as Commanding

Officer, and the GILBERT as Commanding Officer. He served as Chief of Party on several Air Photo Parties, was assigned as Officer in Charge of the Baltimore Photo Office and at the time of his retirement on February 1, 1959, he was serving as District Officer at the Seattle District Office.

Captain Kirsch was transferred to the Department of the Navy, U.S. Marine Corps during World War II from December 9, 1942, until March 2, 1946. During this time he was given temporary promotions to Commander and Captain.

Captain Kirsch is survived by his wife of fifty-two years, Frances M. Curington and three children--daughters Jean C. Gressette and Susan M. Nelson and son John P. Kirsch.

COMMANDER WILLIAM DARYL PATTERSON

MAY 3, 1895 - MARCH 5, 1984

Commander William D. Patterson was born on May 3, 1895, at Neosho, Wisconsin. He attended the University of Wisconsin.

Commander Patterson was appointed as one of the original members of the USC&GS commissioned service in 1917. During his 30-year career, he served aboard numerous ships including the EQUATOR (wire drag), the EXPLORER as Watch Officer and later as Executive Officer, the FATHOMER, PATHFINDER, MARINDUQUE, BACHE as 2nd Officer and later as Executive Officer, the HYDROGRAPHER as Executive Officer, the SURVEYOR, the MARINDUQUE as Commanding Officer, the OCEANOGRAPHER as Executive Officer, the GUIDE and the PIONEER as Commanding Officer. He received his Chief Mate's license any ocean, any tonnage, on December 10, 1927. While in command of the PIONEER during the years 1940 and 1941, he was successful in extending the scheme of triangulation in the vicinity of Yunaska, Seguam, Amlia and Atka Islands, Aleutian Chain, Territory of Alaska. Other assignments included Wire Drag Parties in Alaska, Coast Pilot Division, and construction of several Magnetic & Seismology Observatories in Tucson, Arizona, Sitka, Alaska, Honolulu, Hawaii, and Fairbanks, Alaska. At the time of his retirement, March 1, 1948, he was assigned to the San Francisco Field Station. He held membership in the American Society of Civil Engineers and the American Association for the Advancement of Science and authored numerous sections of the U.S. Coast Pilot.

Commander Patterson's wife, the former Julia C. Gross, died March 18, 1975. He is survived by his three children--two sons, Robert A. and Omar, and one daughter, Juliet M. Hinnenberg.

FROM THE DIRECTOR'S DESK

Commander Nortrup and I recently were invited by the Office of Management and Budget to present a briefing on the NOAA Corps to NOAA's budget examiner. The purpose was informational in nature, so the budget office could better understand the Corps' role in service to NOAA's programs. The briefing was tailored to define the essence of the Corps by answering three questions.

1. Why is there a commissioned corps in NOAA?
2. How is commissioned service different from civilian service?
3. How does NOAA benefit from the existence of the commissioned corps?

I believe the written narrative summary that formed the basis of the briefing may provide a valuable perspective for all commissioned officers. The narrative appears in this BULLETIN under the title "NOAA Corps Brief - August 1984." I urge you to read it.

NPS HYDROGRAPHIC SCIENCES CURRICULUM CERTIFIED

The certification makes the NPS program one of eight so certified programs in the world and the only one in the United States.

Accreditation by FIG-IHO is a landmark event in the development of the NPS Hydrographic Sciences Program which began as a cooperative NOAA/NAVY effort in 1977. Recognition for this program is in large part creditable to the efforts of Lieutenant Commander Gerald B. Mills and Commander Donald E. Nortrup. Commander Glen R. Schaefer is the present NOAA Liaison Officer at NPS.

JUNIOR OFFICER OF THE YEAR NOMINATION

We extend our congratulations to Lieutenant (jg) Michael R. Mathwig, a nominee for the Junior Officer of the Year Award, who was omitted from the list published in the June BULLETIN.

SHIPMENT OF HOUSEHOLD GOODS

Periodic geographic relocation is an inherent element of service in the commissioned corps. The handling and transportation of one's household goods (HHG) can be one of the most exasperating aspects of a relocation. During the past year the trauma of relocation has been further aggravated by rigorous application of a "low bid" carrier selection policy. A year's

experience has shown that along with low bids comes low service. Damage claims against the government have mushroomed with numerous claims originating from the civilian community as well as the Corps.

Relief is coming. In a recent memorandum to the Directors of the Regional Administrative Support Centers, the Office of the Assistant Secretary for Administration, Department of Commerce, recognized the effect of the strict selection policy and set forth comprehensive criteria for future carrier selection. The memorandum emphasizes level-of-service in the selection process and states, in part:

". . . the higher-cost carriers with national reputations have better-trained and more experienced personnel, better organizations to coordinate shipping and warehousing, better warehousing facilities, and better transportation equipment. The higher level of service comes at an initial cost, but is offset by the lower amount of time required of a Transportation Officer to make arrangements and resolve problems and by the lower level of claims levied against the Department."

Attachment 1 to this BULLETIN is an excerpt from the memorandum providing additional information on carrier selection criteria.

Along with its consideration of the low-bid carrier selection policy, the Office of the Assistant Secretary for Administration is also reviewing the procedure for making damage claims resulting from HHG transportation. When the revised procedure is implemented, it will be reported in the BULLETIN.

SEA SERVICE DEPLOYMENT RIBBON

A number of officers have called concerning the qualifications for the Sea Service Deployment Ribbon. This is an authorized Navy/Marine ribbon, and the NOAA Corps will follow the same criteria:

- (1) Before 15 August 1974, no ribbon will be authorized, no matter how many deployments;
- (2) Between 15 August 1974 and 4 January 1979, only one ribbon will be authorized, no matter how many deployments;
- (3) After 4 January 1979, a ribbon (and subsequent star) will be awarded for each 90-day deployment away from home port.

NOAA CORPS BRIEF - August 1984

In order to carry out its program responsibilities, NOAA employs nearly 14,000 people. These employees are administered under a number of personnel administration and pay systems ranging from wage grade and wage marine, to senior

executive service status. Of these systems, the smallest, and probably least understood, is NOAA's commissioned personnel system known as the NOAA Corps. Approximately 400 of NOAA's workforce are commissioned officers.

The NOAA Corps traces its history in NOAA through ESSA and the Coast and Geodetic Survey to 1917. The Corps was created to compensate for the loss of seagoing and field leadership previously supplied by the detail of Army and Navy officers. The Corps' purpose today remains essentially unchanged from its purpose in 1917, i.e., to provide professional leadership in the conduct of arduous, remote, and mobile activities of the organization. For a number of reasons, the commissioned personnel system is uniquely suited to this purpose.

The commissioned personnel system is designed to facilitate mobility and to develop leadership traits and management skills in its members. NOAA Corps officers are expected, in addition, to develop technical competence in at least one of NOAA's principal program areas. Development of these characteristics is achieved through the sequential assignment of officers to progressively more demanding billets combined with appropriate training and education. Selective promotion and retention insures appropriate development.

The commissioned personnel system under which the NOAA Corps operates is essentially the same system used by the military service. In fact, NOAA Corps officers are subject to transfer to the military service in the case of national emergency. Members of the NOAA Corps are recruited from the college campuses of the Nation. Appointment in the Corps requires a degree in one of the scientific disciplines in which NOAA is involved and a minimum of calculus and physics. Physical standards for appointment are rigorous and parallel those of the military service.

Although nearly all the activities of NOAA Corps officers are in support of NOAA program activities, the Corps is a centrally administered organization, independent of the NOAA line offices. Funding and personnel ceilings for the Corps are administered from the Office of the Administrator of NOAA. Management at this level provides the flexibility necessary to assign and develop officers according to relative program needs throughout NOAA and to reallocate Corps resources with changing needs and priorities. Further, like all commissioned services, the grade of NOAA Corps officers is vested in the officer rather than, as in the civilian sector, acquired as a function of the position occupied. This is a necessary condition of the mobility expected of commissioned officers in all services.

Mobility, both organizational and geographic, is inherent to the personnel system. Officers are typically reassigned every 2 to 4 years. Because of this mobility, commissioned officers gain experience in a variety of NOAA activities and develop a uniquely objective perspective on the organization. Officers may, through several assignments, participate in a particular program at several levels ranging from acquisition of field data to establishing program priorities and allocating resources. Conversely, officers may cross organizational lines and participate in a variety of NOAA programs. In either case, the officer brings to each duty station the benefits of his/her experiences in other NOAA activities.

Because of the experience gained in the field activities of NOAA, commissioned officers are particularly valued participants and leaders of those programs ashore. Because of the responsiveness and flexibility of the commissioned personnel system, officers are particularly valued participants and leaders of new organizational initiatives. Because of their centralized NOAA identity, officers are particularly valued as leaders of programs and activities requiring the coordination and cooperation of various NOAA Line Offices.

Excerpt from Memorandum dated May 28, 1984, from Director, Office of Information Services, Department of Commerce, to Directors, Regional Administrative Support Centers.

CARRIER SELECTION CRITERIA

To assure Commerce employees of a satisfactory level of service, the following procedures shall be implemented within the guidelines of the FPMR and the GSA centralized household goods traffic management program:

1. Use of GBL Method. In accordance with existing Department of Commerce policy, the GBL (actual expense) method of shipping household goods will be used since savings to the Government and adequate service to the employee are available by using this method.

2. Selection of Carrier. After receipt of notification of the need to arrange shipment of household goods, a carrier referral list should be requested from GSA in accordance with section 101-40.203-4(b) of the FPMR. The carriers on referral lists should then be reviewed against the service requirements specified in FPMR section 101-40.303-1 and discussed below. In conducting this review, the Transportation Officer should select a carrier who meets the service requirements and whose reputation for satisfactory service is known by the Transportation Officer. If service requirements are not met, the carrier shall not be selected. If a satisfactory carrier cannot be identified on the first carrier referral list furnished by GSA, a second list should be requested. A third list may be requested if necessary. The following criteria, adapted from FPMR section 101-40.303-1 should be applied to determine whether service requirements can be met by prospective carrier:

Availability and suitability of carrier equipment

- o Can you be assured that the carrier will be able to meet the required pickup and delivery dates?
- o Are you satisfied that the carrier will use a suitably-sized, properly-configured vehicle?
- o Will the carrier use a reliable, well-maintained vehicle in good operating condition?

Shipping and receiving facilities at origin and destination

- o Are local agent's facilities adequate or do they reflect lack of investment in plant, equipment or personnel?
- o Are the storage facilities adequate to protect household goods for temporary and nontemporary storage?

Pickup and delivery service

- o Do the local agents have an adequate number of well-trained, experienced personnel available for this shipment?
- o How many years experience do the people have who will be working on your shipment?

Availability of accessorial services

- o Are the required accessorial and special services available?
- o Will the local agent perform an on-site premove survey?
- o Does the local agent use adequate packing materials?
- o Does the local agent have an adequate number of well-trained, experienced packers available for this shipment?
- o How many years of experience do the packers have who will be working on your shipment?

Record of past performance of the carrier

- o Does the carrier have a record of:

Consistent performance of premove survey?

Use of adequate packing materials?

Use of an adequate number of experienced packers and loaders?

Use of suitable equipment?

Keeping schedules for packing, loading, and delivery?

Friendly, courteous service?

Minimal levels of loss and damage?

Timely, fair settlement of claims?

FROM THE DIRECTOR'S DESK

The President recently signed the Department's FY 1985 appropriations bill, providing for continuation of ship operations and other NOAA activities that have been under consideration for reduction. The Ocean Service Program expects to open additional Centers in FY 1985 and will include new billets for the Corps. In addition, a number of program redirections were approved that will require NOAA Corps support. To meet these requirements, the Administrator is approving a small increase in the Corps' FTE capacity in FY 1985.

SPECIAL RECOGNITION

Commander Theodore Wyzewski and Staff of the NOAA Officer Training Center, Kings Point, NY, received a NOAA Unit Citation in recognition of their hard work, dedicated service, and high degree of professionalism in training NOAA Corps officers.

Hull, Director, Atlantic Marine Center, for the actions of the security watch during the accident July 25, 1984, when the M/V STENA MARINER drifted into the ship while it was moored alongside NOAA's Miami facility. Ensign Evelyn D. Lempriere (OOD) was commended for her calm, professional and well-organized handling of the situation.

Lieutenant Commander Alan H. Yanaway was a recipient of a NOAA Unit Citation for his contributions as a staff member with the National Weather Service's Seattle Ocean Services Unit during the period January 1981 to June 1983.

The Director, NOAA Corps, received a letter from Carmen J. Blondin, Deputy Assistant Administrator for Fisheries Resource Management, NMFS commending the outstanding contributions of Lieutenant (jg) James M. Herkelrath. HISTORICAL NOTE

The following item was recently uncovered from a description (1931) of the Coast and Geodetic Survey Tender GILBERT.

"The latest tender is named in honor of Captain J. J. Gilbert who served the Coast and Geodetic Survey for fifty-seven years from 1864 to 1921. This is the record for the field service in the Bureau. Captain Gilbert's field work was principally on the west coast and practically all of it was pioneer work.

He commanded the PATHFINDER (old) in Alaska and brought that vessel to the Philippines. Here he commenced surveys before the insurrection was quelled. Captain Gilbert later directed the work of the Division of Hydrography and Topography for over ten years as Inspector, the title of the chief at that time."

IN MEMORIAM

CAPTAIN CURTIS LEFEVER
January 31, 1898 - August 21, 1984

Captain Curtis LeFever was born January 31, 1898, at Glasgow, Missouri. He attended the University of Michigan, College of Engineering, where he graduated in February 1926 with a Bachelor of Science degree from the Department of Geodesy and Surveying.

Following his graduation, Captain Lefever was appointed as a Deck Officer on July 7, 1926, and then commissioned as Aid with relative rank of Ensign in the Navy on February 23, 1927. During his career of over 31 years he was assigned to the USC&GS Ships MIKAWEE, HYDROGRAPHER, DISCOVERER, GUIDE, SURVEYOR, FATHOMER as Executive Officer, WESTDAHL as Executive Officer, the LESTER JONES as Executive Officer, and later as Commanding Officer, and the BOWIE as Commanding Officer. Other assignments included Chief of geodetic field parties, and work in geophysics, charts and coastal surveys. Typical of the promotion practices during the period of his career, he was promoted to Hydrographic and Geodetic Engineer with rank of Lieutenant Commander in the Coast and Geodetic Survey on October 1, 1946. During 1955, he was on geodetic duty in Central and South America with the Inter-American Geodetic Survey. At the time of his retirement on January 31, 1958, he had been serving as District Officer at the Seattle District Office for the previous 2 years.

During World War II, Captain LeFever was awarded a Certificate of Service for the period 7 December 1941 to 1 September 1945. The certificate was issued for having worked on projects for the Department of the Navy in areas determined to be of immediate military hazard. He was also awarded the Pacific War Zone Ribbon.

Captain LeFever is survived by his wife, the former Alice Geniesse and one son, John C. LeFever.

SBP OVERVIEW

1. WHAT IS SBP?

SBP is the Survivor Benefit Plan that was established by Congress in 1972. It is designed to provide income protection for dependent survivors of service members who die in retirement or while on active duty after reaching retirement eligibility (20 years service).

2. WHO IS COVERED BY SBP?

If you have over 20 years of service you are covered. This means that if you die on active duty, your spouse will receive monthly benefits after your death. This benefit costs you nothing while you are on active duty.

3. WHAT HAPPENS TO SBP WHEN I RETIRE?

You are given several options. You may elect to (1) continue SBP enrollment coverage; (2) continue SBP enrollment at a reduced amount; or (3) decline SBP coverage entirely. If you fail to make any election, you are automatically enrolled for full coverage and your retired pay will be reduced to pay for the coverage.

4. WHAT IF I DO NOT WANT MAXIMUM COVERAGE FOR FAMILY MEMBERS?

Then you must elect not to participate or to participate at a lower level of protection.

NOTE: RETIRED PAY STOPS WHEN YOU DIE! IF YOU ELECT NOT TO PARTICIPATE IN SBP YOUR SURVIVORS CAN NOT RECEIVE A MONTHLY ANNUITY!

5. HOW MUCH WILL MY SURVIVORS RECEIVE IF I ELECT SBP?

That depends on a figure called a BASE AMOUNT which you select. The maximum base amount permitted by law is full retired pay; the minimum is \$300.

The payment to the survivor is 55 percent of the base amount. For example, if your retired pay is \$1,000 per month, you may select any amount from \$1,000 down to \$300 as the base amount. If you select \$1,000 as the base amount, your survivors will receive \$550 per month (55 percent of the base amount selected).

6. CAN I EVER CHANGE MY MIND ABOUT ELECTING OR NOT ELECTING SBP?

The SBP decision you make at retirement is basically irrevocable--final. If you have a spouse or child when you retire and you decline to participate in SBP, you will not have an opportunity after retirement to change that decision. That is, you cannot later cover your current spouse, or another spouse if you remarry.

If you elect coverage for family members dependent on you when you retire, the coverage will continue as long as the family members are eligible to receive SBP payments. If these family members become ineligible for SBP, the cost of coverage is suspended. This means you pay for SBP only when you have a beneficiary who will profit from it.

7. WHO CAN I ELECT COVERAGE FOR?

You may select one of the following options:

a. Spouse only coverage

This option provides a monthly SBP check to your spouse for life in the event of your death. If your surviving spouse remarries before age 60, the payments are suspended. However, if that marriage ends, the SBP checks start again.

b. Child only coverage

Children are covered until age 18, or age 22 if full-time students. Disabled children are paid for life if their disability causes them to be incapable of self-support. The disability must have been incurred when the child was under age 18, or between the ages of 18 and 22 and attending school full-time.

c. Spouse and child coverage

In this case, the spouse is the primary beneficiary, and the children are paid an annuity only if the spouse remarries before age 60 or dies. With this coverage, there is only one annuity, payable to the spouse or children.

d. Former spouse coverage

e. Insurable interest coverage (for members unmarried at retirement).

Contact the Commissioned Personnel Division at 443-8616 for terms of the above two coverages and/or refer to NDM 56-58, Commissioned Officers - Survivor Benefit Plan.

8. WHAT WILL SBP COST ME?

As noted in the answer to Question # 2., SBP costs you nothing while you are on active duty. When you retire, the cost for SBP is:

a. Spouse only coverage

2.5 percent of the first \$300 of the of the base amount plus 10 percent of the base amount in excess of \$300. For example, if the base amount you select is \$1,000, then your SBP monthly cost is \$77.50 (2.5 percent of \$300 = \$7.50 plus 10 percent of the base amount in excess of \$300, i.e., 10 percent of (\$1,000 - \$300) equals \$70.00).

b. Child only coverage

The cost is based on your age and that of the youngest child. As an example, if you select a base amount of \$900 and you are age 44 and your youngest child is 12, the monthly cost of SBP is \$2.88.

c. Spouse and child coverage

The cost is the spouse cost plus a small charge for the children. The child portion of the cost depends on your age, and the ages of your spouse and youngest child. As an example, if you select a base amount of \$900 and you are age 44, your spouse is age 42, and your youngest child is age 12, the monthly cost of SBP is \$67.86.

d. Former spouse coverage

e. Insurable interest coverage

Contact the Commissioned Personnel Division for costs of the above two coverages.

9. I SEE A LOT OF ADS FOR COMMERCIAL LIFE INSURANCE WITH SOME OF THESE POLICIES COSTING LESS THAN SBP. HOW DOES SBP STACK UP AGAINST COMMERCIAL INSURANCE?

That's difficult to answer. It's hard to make a comparison since each family's needs are unique and there are many different types of commercial insurance programs.

However, there are a number of factors you should think about as you consider how to best provide for your survivor's needs.

a. Most premiums (cost) for life insurance policies increase throughout the life of the policy. So does the cost of SBP after retirement. However, SBP payments to survivors also increase through a cost-of-living adjustment (COLA). This COLA is equal to the COLA given for military retired pay.

When considering a commercial insurance policy, ask the agent selling it if the policy provides for a lifetime, cost-of-living adjusted benefit as SBP does.

b. Perhaps you have decided to buy a life insurance policy that will pay your spouse or children \$100,000, figuring that you can quit worrying because your survivors will have all that money to invest. A \$100,000 payment may seem quite large today but what will it be worth 25 years from now in today's dollars? Assuming a constant inflation rate of 7 percent, the \$100,000 benefit after 25 years is worth only \$16,300. As mentioned above SBP's increasing payments through COLA will help keep pace with inflation.

c. Let's say you're 45, you're retiring, you've had a heart attack, and you have hypertension. Could you buy a private insurance policy under those conditions? If so, what premiums would you have to pay? Age and health affect neither your eligibility to participate in SBP or the cost of SBP.

d. Have you considered tax savings? SBP premiums deducted from retired pay are not taxable income. You pay for commercial insurance with taxable dollars. The SBP survivor annuity is subject to Federal income tax but then the survivor usually is in a lower tax bracket. Proceeds of commercial insurance are not taxable, but if they are invested, taxes may have to be paid on any interest earned.

SCIENCE OFFICER

RANK: LT-LCDR

Duties

Incumbent is the team leader for the Ocean Service Center "User Outreach Office." Should have a broad understanding of forecast techniques in the marine environment, be familiar with analysis techniques used to define the distribution of significant ocean properties (e.g., sea surface temperature, mixed layer depth, ocean color, etc.). This knowledge will permit the officer to advise the public with regard to the use of NOAA's ocean products.

OCEANOGRAPHIC OFFICER

RANK: ENS-LT

Duties

Incumbent should be an officer inclined toward the physical sciences. Should have an understanding of the physics of ocean processes and be prepared to develop operational products (e.g., sea surface temperature and mixed layer depth analyses).

Duties

Incumbent should have had training in either the biological sciences or fisheries. In addition, incumbent must possess/develop an understanding about the characteristics and accessing of the National Oceanographic Data Center data base as well as other NOAA oceanographic data sources. As a fisheries specialist, the incumbent would act as an informed source and guide for the retrieval of fisheries-related products and services.

BAQ/VHA ELIGIBILITY

Several instances of misunderstanding have arisen recently relating to the payment of BAQ and VHA to officers without dependents while assigned to sea duty. The following may help clarify the matter.

Officers without dependents assigned to ships may choose to live ashore. If the ship is in homeport for a period of at least 21 days, those officers living ashore are eligible to receive BAQ and VHA. Once established, the eligibility continues through a subsequent deployment of less than 90 days or for the first 90 days of an extended deployment, provided such eligibility is not otherwise interrupted. Eligibility for BAQ and VHA is terminated by: a) the officer's reoccupation of government quarters unless reoccupation is directly associated with deployment, or b) a deployment of greater than 90 days.

The 90-day extension of eligibility is intended to provide the officer the opportunity of maintaining quarters ashore during short deployments without incurring undue costs.

Both eligibility and the expiration of eligibility must be reported to NC1 by commanding officers in accordance with NDM 56-50. Failure to report expiration of eligibility will result in overpayment and subsequent reimbursement deductions.

Semiannual Fitness Reports

NOAA Directives Manual 56-06 requires the submission of Fitness Reports on all Ensigns and Lieutenants (junior grade) semiannually for periods ending June 30 and December 31. Henceforth, semiannual reports will be required only for those officers with less than 3 years of service. The Directive will be revised to reflect this change.

DEERS UPDATE

DEERS (Defense Eligibility Enrollment Reporting System) is a program used by the Uniformed Services Medical Treatment Facilities (USMTF's) to verify the eligibility for medical care of all Uniformed Services' members and their dependents. As of October 1, 1984, USMTF's will provide nonemergency care only upon presentation of a valid Identification Card (ID) and confirmation of eligibility through the DEERS system. Similarly, claims made to CHAMPUS will be paid only upon confirmation of eligibility.

Registration in DEERS is maintained by the submission to Commissioned Personnel, NCI, of DD Form 1172, Application for Uniformed Services Identification Card. Currently, with only a few exceptions, all NOAA Corps eligibles are properly registered.

To ensure continuing eligibility for medical care, several new processes are now being implemented:

a. Possession of a valid identification card is mandatory for sponsors and dependents (10 years of age or older) to obtain nonemergency medical care at a USMTF. Since there is a lag between issuance of a new card and the actual entry of the new data into the DEERS computer, a 120-day "grace" period has been established during which the computer's data on an expired card will not preclude treatment if a new card has been issued. To avoid inconvenience to dependents, we recommend that identification cards pending expiration within 120 days be obtained between 60 and 90 days prior to the actual expiration date.

b. Sponsors of dependent children over 21 years of age and enrolled in a college in a full-time status must obtain and submit a statement from the registrar of that institution attesting to their dependent's student status. Annual renewal of the dependent's identification cards cannot be accomplished without this statement.

c. Copies of Birth Certificates for new-born dependents must be submitted to this office along with the DD 1172 necessary for DEERS Registration. All dependents must be registered. Although a newborn may have been delivered in a military hospital, do not assume that the child will be automatically registered by that hospital. The military hospitals do not perform this function. To allow for delays in obtaining Birth Certificates from local governments, a grace period of up to 1 year has been established for enrolling a dependent infant. Once the Birth Certificate is available, registration should be initiated without further delay.

d. All dependents 10 years of age and older must be in possession of a valid ID Card. We recommend that all sponsors check their dependent's ID Cards to insure that they have not expired.

CHAMPUS NOTES

Recently we have received several CHAMPUS claims from active duty officers for payment of civilian medical services. CHAMPUS is a program for dependent and retired officer medical care; it is not for members in active status. Active duty officers must submit claims for emergency care in accordance with instructions received from the PHS HOTLINE. All care, other than emergency care, must be obtained from a source designated by the PHS or from a Uniformed Services Medical Treatment Facility. PHS HOTLINE numbers are 1-800-368-2777 (Outside Maryland), 301-443-1493 (Maryland only).

PROCEED TIME

Contrary to popular belief, proceed time is not an entitlement associated with all permanent changes of station. Proceed time is a period of authorized absence, not chargeable as leave or travel, which may be authorized as a delay in executing certain types of permanent changes of station. It is intended to enable a service member to attend to certain administrative and personal details before going to or from an assignment that may preclude normal business transactions. Proceed time is currently authorized by NDM 56-12 only for permanent changes of station to or from a ship or overseas billet.

Proceed time is not authorized in the following circumstances:

1. Incident to reporting for active duty and assignment to first permanent duty stations.
2. Between two ships having the same homeport.
3. Incident to separation or retirement.
4. When PCS orders express haste or specifically preclude proceed time.
5. When executing a PCS between shore stations in the CONUS.

PARKING FEES

Payment of parking fees for Privately Owned Conveyance (POC) travel within the local duty areas is not authorized for members of the uniformed services. Periodically, we receive inquiries on why payment of parking fees for officer's cars used in conduct of government business in and around the duty station is unauthorized, although civilians may be reimbursed for such fees. Simply stated, in 1962, the Comptroller General of the United States ruled that Congress had no intention of authorizing such reimbursement, although Congress did authorize such payment for civilian employees under similar circumstances. (Reference: COMP GEN B147581).

This ruling does not apply to parking fees, such as airport parking, incurred in execution of travel during Temporary Duty, as ordered by a Travel Order, NOAA Form 56-1. Such fees may be reimbursed on the travel voucher.

VETERANS EDUCATIONAL ASSISTANCE PROGRAM (CHAPTER 32)

This contributory program is intended to provide for educational assistance to Uniformed Services Personnel who have entered on active duty after 1 January 1977. Until recently, incremental payments to the fund were required on a monthly basis until the payments totaled \$2,700. Recent changes now allow qualified active duty personnel to make lump-sum payments to this program. Payment is no longer restricted to monthly contributions. For active duty officers, the Veterans Administration has interpreted NOAA Corps eligibility to use this program after 6 years of service. Those who have resigned may use the program immediately upon resignation.

FROM THE DIRECTOR'S DESK

This Bulletin contains summaries of legislation passed by the 98th Congress that provide changes for the NOAA Corps. Implementing regulations will be promulgated in the near future. Some of the provisions affecting pay and allowances will become effective on January 1, 1985.

SPECIAL RECOGNITION

Lieutenant John M. Tokar was recently recognized by Dr. Vernon E. Derr, Director, Environmental Research Laboratories, for his work as co-author of a research paper entitled, "The Structure of Marine Fulvic and Humic Acids," Marine Chemistry. He was among a group of six winners of the 1984 Outstanding Scientific Paper Awards within ERL.

Lieutenant David J. Tennesen received a Sustained Superior Performance and Cash Award in recognition of performance as Chief of Air Photo Mission in the Photogrammetry Branch, Office of Charting and Geodetic Services.

Commander Glen R. Schaefer was commended by the Director, Pacific Marine Center, for the excellent logistic support provided to make Dr. Byrne's Year of the Ocean Open House and cruise aboard the NOAA Ship McARTHUR at Monterey, California, a great success.

CHIEF, COMMISSIONED PERSONNEL

Commander Walter S. Simmons will assume the duties of Chief, Commissioned Personnel Division, on November 15, 1984.

NOAA-RELATED LEGISLATION - 98TH CONGRESS

The 98th Congress adjourned on October 12, 1984. During this latest session of Congress, many bills were passed and subsequently signed by the President, a number of which affect the NOAA Corps. A summary of these bills and related material is presented below. For further information please contact Steve Eisenberg at FTS 443-8616.

1. Senate bill S. 1102 - Marine Protection, Research, and Sanctuaries Act

This bill was signed by the President on October 19, 1984, and became Public Law 98-498 (P.L. 98-498). In addition to addressing Marine Sanctuaries amendments of 1984, this bill also includes personnel provisions for NOAA Corps involuntary separation practices, redefinition of flag grades, temporary promotion policies and authority to budget for health care for the NOAA Corps and Wage Marine employees.

The involuntary separation provision includes the grade of lieutenant commander among the grades which, if not otherwise qualified for retirement, may be separated from the service as recommended by a personnel board.

The bill aligns the grade structure of the NOAA Corps with that of the Navy and Coast Guard by replacing the grade of rear admiral (lower half) with the grade of commodore. In addition, the bill allows the President to appoint, with advice and consent of the Senate, one officer to the grade of vice admiral, three officers to the grade of rear admiral, and three officers to the grade of commodore.

The bill removes the limit on the number of officers who may hold temporary promotions. An officer in any permanent grade may be temporarily promoted to the next higher grade by the President. The temporary promotion will terminate upon the transfer of the officer to a new billet not requiring the higher grade.

2. House of Representatives bill H.R. 5167 Fiscal Year 1985 (FY 85) Defense Authorization Act

This bill was signed by the President on October 19, 1984. The bill addresses a variety of military pays and benefits:

a. Basic Pay - Effective January 1, 1985, basic pay will be raised 4 percent.

b. Basic Allowance for Subsistence (BAS) - Effective January 1, 1985, BAS will be raised 4 percent.

c. Basic Allowance for Quarters (BAQ) - Effective January 1, 1985, under a new formula, BAQ rates will be set at 65 percent of the national median housing costs with respect to each pay grade. BAQ rates will increase for most officers. BAQ rates for a few pay grades will decrease

under the new formula. With-dependents rates for 0-2, 0-3, 0-7 and above as well as the without-dependents rate for 0-2 will decrease. However, under a "save-pay" provision, officers in these grades as of January 1, 1985, will be able to receive the old rates until they move into a higher pay grade.

d. Variable Housing Allowance (VHA) - VHA rates will rise January 1, 1985, according to a new formula that also links VHA for the first time to national median housing costs of service members. Members will qualify for VHA if assigned to an area where average housing costs exceed 85 percent of the national median housing costs reported by members in the same pay grade.

e. Dependent Medical Care - Currently, routine dental care within the United States may be provided to dependents on a space-available basis only where adequate civilian facilities are unavailable. Effective July 1, 1985, dependents of active duty personnel may receive dental care at military facilities on a space-available basis, even where adequate civilian facilities are available. As before, active duty dental needs will be met first.

f. CHAMPUS - Dependents of active duty personnel will now be able to receive one free eye examination per year per dependent.

g. Rent-Plus in Alaska and Hawaii - Provision is made for a switch from rent-plus to VHA for service members assigned to Alaska or Hawaii on or after January 1, 1985. Those members in Alaska or Hawaii as of December 31, 1984, receiving rent-plus will continue under rent-plus until they leave the state as a result of a permanent change of duty station. See item 3 below regarding rent-plus.

3. House Joint Resolution 648 (H.J. Res. 648) Continuing Appropriations Act for FY 85.

This act was signed by the President on October 19, 1984. It provided funding for most government agencies for FY 85. One section of the Act retains rent-plus for service members in Alaska or Hawaii; thus it contradicts rent-plus language in the Defense Authorization Act (Item 2.g., above). DOD officials believe that the U.S. Comptroller General ultimately will have to decide whether the authorization act or the continuing appropriations act should be followed.

4. Housing Allowance Tax Breaks.

The Treasury Department and the Internal Revenue Service have argued that deductions allowed service members for mortgage interest and real estate taxes should be reduced by the amount they receive each year in tax-free housing allowances. Congress and DOD oppose this effort. However, Congress adjourned without voting any permanent protection for the housing allowance tax breaks. An October 5 meeting between Defense Secretary Weinberger and Treasury Secretary Regan apparently proved inconclusive. Secretary Regan did state that the Treasury would not disallow military deductions without cabinet approval and no action would take place on allowances paid before January 1, 1986, in any case.

NOAA Corps Liaison Officer at Fort Sill

The NOAA Corps Liaison Officer billet at the U.S. Army Field Artillery School at Fort Sill, Oklahoma, will no longer be filled on a continuous basis. The billet will be retained, however, in the School's mobilization structure in the event of a future national emergency and the transfer of NOAA Corps officers to the Field Artillery.

This billet's origin dates back to 1942 when over half of the C&GS Officer Corps were formally transferred to the War and Navy Departments. In 1948, one of a number of the transferred officers was retained at Fort Sill as Liaison to the Department of Observation. His primary duties were with the development of surveying and target acquisition equipment. In June 1945, the Artillery Board was transferred from Fort Bragg to Fort Sill, at which time, a second C&GS officer was assigned. In 1957, the duties of both were combined into one billet. The duties were primarily associated with the field of geodesy and surveying in support of the U.S. Army Field Artillery Board, Field Artillery School's Department of Target Acquisition, and Directorate of Combat Development.

Following are highlights of projects accomplished by officers assigned over the past years. During World War II and just prior to the Korean Conflict, training of large numbers of Army personnel took place in survey and target acquisition with existing equipment. The artillery survey manual also was written during this period. The Army Ephemeris was devised and publication was initiated on an annual basis. The Universal Transverse Mercator Grid was established for Fort Sill and vicinity. Artillery survey methods and instruments were adapted to the mil system of angular measure, resulting in the Army issuance of log books to include log functions of angles in mils. Electronic Distance Measurement equipment was tested and introduced as a new survey tool. Many proposals for new survey devices and techniques were investigated and tested; some are still under development and test while others were rejected.

VETERANS ADMINISTRATION NEWS

Question - Can a veteran use his loan guaranty benefits to purchase a home outside the United States?

Answer - Loan guaranty benefits are available only in the United States and its territories and possessions.

Question - How does a veteran initiate a claim for VA compensation or pension benefits?

Answer - The veteran may contact the nearest VA office, a service officer of one of the veterans service organizations, or a state or county veterans' office to obtain the forms necessary to initiate the claim. Any of these sources can provide information about the benefit programs and assist in completing the forms.

Question - Is it necessary for me to inform the VA of my new address if my monthly benefit check is directly deposited in the bank?

Answer - Failure to keep the VA notified of your current address could result in your missing important correspondence and literature. Such material is sent to the veterans' address of record. Suspension of your payments could occur if you fail to report for a physical examination or supply request evidence, even though you did not receive the notice because it was sent to a former address.

Question - Is a veteran with only peacetime service eligible to participate in the Emergency Veterans' Job Training Act of 1983?

Answer - No. This act is designed to assist unemployed veterans who served on active duty during the Korean Conflict or the Vietnam Era.

Question - I am attending school, full-time, under the VA's dependents education assistance program. Do I qualify for the VA work-study program?

Answer - No. The program is designed to assist unemployed veterans who served on active duty during the Vietnam Era.

IN MEMORIAM

CAPTAIN FRED NATELLA, NOAA

February 14, 1904 - September 7, 1984

Captain Fred Natella was born February 14, 1904, in Salerno, Italy. He came to the United States in 1913 and became a naturalized citizen on March 9, 1923. He attended Armour Institute of Technology (now Illinois Institute of Technology) where he received a Bachelor of Science degree in Civil Engineering on June 7, 1928. Following his graduation, he was appointed as Deck Officer and on July 15, 1930, was commissioned as Ensign.

Captain Natella's 35-year career included ship assignments aboard the MIKAWA, HYDROGRAPHER, OCEANOGRAPHER, GILBERT as Executive Officer, SURVEYOR, PATHFINDER, and PIONEER as Navigating Officer and Commanding Officer, and the BOWIE as Commanding Officer. His other assignments included various triangulation field parties working in Louisiana, Virginia, West Virginia, Pennsylvania, Trinidad, Newfoundland, and Bermuda. He performed geodetic work at both Washington Headquarters and the New York Field Office and worked on photogrammetric field parties. At the time of his retirement on March 1, 1964, he was assigned as District Officer in Portland, Oregon. During World War II Captain Natella was cited by both the Army and Navy for having served in areas of immediate military hazard for the periods March 1, 1942, to February 28, 1943, and February 15, 1945, to September 1, 1945. For this he was awarded the Coast and Geodetic Survey Meritorious Service Ribbon, the Atlantic War Zone Ribbon and the Pacific War Zone Ribbon.

Captain Natella is survived by his wife of 51 years, the former Ruth A. Anis, and two children, a daughter, Carolyn N. Ferguson and a son, Captain Allen F. Natella, USAF.

FROM THE DIRECTOR'S DESK

All of us at NOAA Corps Headquarters send warmest season's greetings to all of our NOAA family -- members of the Corps, active and retired, and their families. This is a time of the year to pause and renew ties with those who are so important to us during the rest of the year. To all -- our blessings for good health, happiness and a peaceful year.

SPECIAL RECOGNITION

Rear Admiral Charles K. Townsend has been recognized with the Department of Commerce's highest award, the Gold Medal, for "outstanding leadership, energy and ability" in managing NOAA's Pacific Marine Center in Seattle, Washington, during 1980-84. The citation, bestowed in a ceremony presided over by Commerce Secretary Malcolm Baldrige, notes Rear Admiral Townsend's contributions in the coordination of scientific programs and promotion of NOAA's image as a leader in the scientific community.

Lieutenant (jg) Russell L. Richards has been recognized with a Special Act of Service cash award for his performance in exceeding normal requirements of his position as a computer staff member in the Computer Support Group at Pacific Marine Environment Research Laboratory, OAR.

Promotion Zone Size Revised

Chapter 56, Section 46 of the NOAA Directives Manual which addresses Commissioned Officers - Promotion, currently requires that promotion zones include at least twice the number of selections planned for promotion "to any grade above lieutenant." Recent practice has been to apply this zone size ratio to selections for all grades. The Directive further requires that the Officer Personnel Board (OPB) "recommend for promotion those officers whom the Board considers best qualified."

As originally conceived, this large zone approach was intended to afford the OPB the opportunity to "deep select" truly outstanding officers otherwise qualified for promotion. However, in the lower grades, the large zones combined with singular "best qualified" criteria for selection can result in a higher passover rate of due-course officers than was intended, or is needed, to maintain the grade structure.

In recognition of these conflicting objectives, the OPB recently recommended that promotion zone sizes should be redefined as follows:

Zone size to be not less than the number of selections planned multiplied by the applicable multiplier. In cases where the product is a fraction, the minimum zone size will be the next higher number.

0-2	1.25
0-3	1.25
0-4	1.50
0-5	1.50
0-6	2.00

The Director, NOAA Corps, has approved this revision, and it will be used for future zone sizes. NDM 56-46 will be revised to include this change.

Duties

Serves as Station Chief of the Geophysical Monitoring for Climatic Change (GMCC) Observatory, South Pole, Antarctica. The GMCC mission is to monitor baseline levels of atmospheric constituents that influence, or are related to, climatic change. A primary goal of the program is to measure the trends and cycles of gases and aerosols over extended periods of 10 and 30 years and to determine the natural and man-made influence on these concentrations and their impact on climate. These activities form part of a larger global network incorporated by the World Meteorological Organization and the United Nations Environmental Program.

The Chief of the South Pole Observatory is responsible for operation, calibration and maintenance of instruments used to monitor trace constituents in the atmosphere. These instruments include a spectrophotometer for total ozone; a photocell oxidant meter for surface detectors; pyranometers and pyrhemometers for solar radiation; an infrared gas analyzer for carbon dioxide; and a nephelometer for light scattering properties of atmospheric aerosols.

The Officer collects data and analyzes results to identify data anomalies and establish local trends at the observatory. With the station technician, the officer assures proper operation and performance of station monitoring systems. They also test and evaluate new instruments and monitoring methods and make recommendations to the Director, GMCC, for their application at any or all GMCC stations. The officer further performs administrative duties required for normal operation of the station including preparation of periodic tabulation and submission of monthly data and station summary reports to the GMCC office at ERL Headquarters in Boulder, Colorado.

Training and experience in physical science, equivalent to a bachelor's degree in atmospheric science, physics, chemistry, or related physical sciences is required. The officer must be able to physically and psychologically work in an isolated environment for an extended period.

Other desired attributes are experience in field measurements of physical parameters of atmospheric or earth science as well as an aptitude for precise laboratory measurements of trace constituents. Experience or training in programming and/or use of micro or mini computer systems would also be desirable.

The usual work environment will be indoors at the South Pole Clean Air Facility. Instrument installation and repairs will be done in the harsh Antarctic environment and requires good physical condition. Logistic support is provided to the U. S. Antarctic Program by the U. S. Navy.

IN MEMORIAM

REAR ADMIRAL ALVIN CECIL THORSON, NOAA (RETIRED)

November 20, 1899 - November 27, 1984

Rear Admiral Alvin C. Thorson was born November 20, 1899, in Hatton, North Dakota. He attended the University of North Dakota where he graduated with a Bachelor of Science Degree in Civil Engineering in June 1924. Following his graduation he was appointed as a deck officer and on December 2, 1925, he was commissioned as an ensign.

During his career, his assignments included serving aboard the following ships: RANGER, DISCOVERER, SURVEYOR as junior officer and later in his career as commanding officer, he also was commanding officer of the wire drag vessels PARKER, BOWEN and STIRNI, on the PATHFINDER and at time of his retirement in 1956, was serving as commanding officer of the NOAA Ship EXPLORER. His other assignments included Chief of Party on numerous precise level parties, Junior Officer at the NW District Office in Seattle, Washington, Chief of Party in triangulation, and on the Director's staff at headquarters.

Admiral Thorson was transferred to the Department of the Army from February 24, 1942 until April 20, 1946. During this time, he served in the following battles and campaigns: Naples Foggia, Rome Arno, Southern France, Rhineland and Central Europe. For his service he was awarded the Bronze Star Medal, Army Commendation Ribbon, European African Middle Eastern Campaign Medal with five Bronze Battle Stars, American Campaign Medal, World War II Victory Medal and the Army of Occupation Medal with the German Clasp.

Based on the Act of June 1942 (33 USC 864e) as amended, Admiral Thorson, although retired in the rank as captain, was given the honorary rank of rear admiral. This Act provided:

"All Officers of the Coast and Geodetic Survey who have been specially commended for their performance of duty in actual combat by the head of the executive department under whose jurisdiction such duty was performed, shall, upon retirement, be placed on the retired list with the rank of the next higher grade: Provided, that the provisions of this section shall not apply in the case of any officer who has been so commended if the act or service justifying the commendation was performed after December 31, 1946."

Admiral Thorson is survived by his wife, Hattie Mae.

FROM THE DIRECTOR'S DESK

On the matter of BEARDS--There has been much press on the Navy's recent decision to ban the wearing of beards by Navy uniformed personnel. This has led to questions of whether the NOAA Corps will follow suit. I still feel this is a matter of personal preference. I remind all officers that the high standards for NOAA Corps grooming remain unchanged and are covered in the NOAA Corps Uniform Regulations (NDM 56-68, 01-03). And, while I fully concur with the Navy's slogan of "Pride and Professionalism," I leave it up to each officer to maintain as neat an appearance as possible, both in uniform and out of uniform. Our service continues to demand much in the way of arduous duty, much of it in remote sections of the country, which sometimes lends itself to a greater tolerance for individual freedom. At the same time, in positions of greater public visibility and authority, it is incumbent upon each officer to present the best possible image of a uniformed service member.

SPECIAL RECOGNITION

The Officers and Crew of the NOAA Ship PEIRCE received a NOAA Unit Citation for high productivity during the 1983 field season in support of the nautical charting program on the East Coast and Great Lakes.

Lieutenant (jg) Martin P. Conricote was recognized by Mr. Jim Weiler of the U.S. Coast Guard Auxiliary for his excellent presentation to Delaware and Pennsylvania auxiliaries describing the mission of NOAA and work of the NOAA Ship PEIRCE on the Delaware Bay project.

Ensign David A. Hodges received a Special Act of Service cash award for his extraordinary effort to provide shipboard training to several high school students during their 2-week visit aboard the NOAA Ship WHITING.

REVISIONS TO THE NOAA DIRECTIVES MANUAL

Chapter 56-45, NOAA Directives Manual (NDM), is being replaced by three new and revised chapters that have gone to the printer. The new chapters, which contain material from the previous NDM 56-45, are: NDM 56-38 Commissioned Officers - Detachment for Cause; and NDM 56-41 Career Development for Commissioned Officers. The remaining material from the previous NDM 56-45 has been revised to form the new NDM 56-45 Commissioned Officers - Billets and Officer Assignments.

These chapters include revised criteria to be used in evaluating individual cases in consideration of detachment for cause, of career development requests, of billet requests and of officer assignments.

CHANGE TO VARIABLE HOUSING ALLOWANCE (VHA)

In accordance with PL 98-525, effective 1 January 1985, the Joint Travel Regulations have been changed to eliminate several periods of entitlement currently available to recipients of VHA.

1. Personnel executing a permanent change-of-station (PCS) will no longer receive VHA during the number of travel days allowed for direct travel between the old and new permanent duty stations, or the period of travel actually used, whichever is less. This change is mandatory and is based on the member's travel, not the travel of the family or termination of family residence at the old station.

2. In certain cases in CONUS, VHA may now be paid for location of the member's dependents' residence rather than the member's place of duty. This provision must be approved on a case-by-case basis based upon a determination by the Secretary of the Service concerned or his designee that, "It is necessary for the member's dependents to establish a permanent residence in a military housing area other than the one in which the member's permanent duty station is located."

3. A member is not entitled to a variable housing allowance if the member is assigned adequate unaccompanied Government quarters appropriate for his/her grade, rank or rating and authorized a basic allowance for quarters at the "with dependents" rate because of a court order requiring the member to pay support for the dependents.

Procedures

Forward without delay, endorsed copies of PCS travel orders, including endorsements for any temporary duty stations enroute, to the Commissioned Personnel Division. If an officer desires consideration for payment of VHA at the dependent's residence location, other than the sponsor's place of duty, a letter requesting such a determination must be sent to the Director, NOAA Corps, through the Marine Center Director or head of the appropriate line or staff office.

PCS MOVING EXPENSES REPORTED AS INCOME

Following a Permanent Change-of-Station (PCS), the cost of a Government Bill of Lading (in-kind-transportation) is added to an officer's annual statement of income (Form W-2) reported to the Internal Revenue Service (IRS). Although this amount is reported as taxable income, it should be adjusted out of the yearly gross income on IRS Form 1040 by use of an IRS Form 3903. Failure to use this form in preparation of your annual submission normally results in an audit several months later. IRS Publication Number 17 provides instructions and explains the adjustment procedure. Although some publications issued by other than IRS sources may state that the NOAA Corps is exempt from this reporting requirement, it is not true. The U.S. Code requires that moving expenses for the uniformed services be reported unless a specific exemption is made by Congress. Although the military services have received such exemptions, the NOAA Corps has not. Furthermore, it is to your financial advantage to be aware of this requirement.

WITHHOLDING OF INCOME TAX FROM DISLOCATION ALLOWANCES

The only PCS Travel/Transportation payment directly taxed as income is the Dislocation Allowance (DLA) paid to officers executing qualified PCS moves. This allowance is the same amount as an officer's monthly Basic Allowance for Quarters. The DOC, Management Service Center, routinely withholds 20 percent of the DLA for Federal income tax and 2 percent of the DLA for State income tax from all vouchers for PCS moves.

Travel advance funds requested for PCS moves should be less than expected entitlements by at least 25 percent of the DLA to allow for the withholding of income tax. This will avoid the complication of a "demand letter" for payback, and/or a deduction from your pay to cover the tax.

OFFICER PERSONNEL BOARD (OPB) ANNUAL REVIEW

The OPB will conduct its annual review of the Lineal List in late March 1985. During the annual review process, the fitness reports and personnel files of all officers are reviewed in detail. The board works from documented evidence only; therefore, each officer should continue to ensure that documentation of training, experience, skills, professional activities and any relevant material, have been properly submitted to NCL.

The objective of this extensive review is to examine the quality of service and capability within the Corps and to see that the lineal order reasonably reflects a progression of abilities, experiences, contributions, and potential of NOAA Corps officers. While the OPB no longer attempts to "fine tune" the list during this review to reflect an exact order of officer progress for promotion purposes, it does recommend adjustments in some cases where such action is clearly warranted.

NEW PAY SCALE

Attached to the end of this Bulletin is the new pay scale for commissioned officers, effective 1 January 1985, updating the 1 October 1984 Roster of Commissioned Officers.

CHAMPUS NEWS - CHAMPUS MID-ATLANTIC REGION CLAIMS MAILING ADDRESSES

A Reminder: Military families and health care providers in five Mid-Atlantic states and the District of Columbia (DC) will have their CHAMPUS claims processed by Wisconsin Physicians Service, beginning 1 February 1985.

The five states affected by the change in processors in CHAMPUS' Mid-Atlantic Region are Delaware, Maryland, North Carolina, Pennsylvania and Virginia. Families and providers in the five states and DC should continue to send claims to the current claims processor--Blue Cross & Blue Shield of South Carolina--through 31 January 1985.

FROM THE DIRECTOR'S DESK

Over the past couple of years, Captain Burroughs has been leading an effort to strengthen the NOAA Corps incentive awards system and has enjoyed the help and support of the Uniform Board and individual volunteers. In this issue, we want to report on that progress and on other changes to the Uniform Regulations. Some of the uniform changes will include name changes: Tropical White Long will be renamed Summer White, in concert with Naval usage, and will be the prescribed Uniform of the Day in the metropolitan Washington, D.C. area this summer. Tropical Khaki Long will become Summer Khaki and will be the prescribed Uniform of the Day in the Norfolk, Virginia area. Tropical Blue Long will become Summer Blue and will be prescribed for wear in the Seattle, Washington area. Other geographic locations should conform to the appropriate uniform for those areas.

SPECIAL RECOGNITION

Lieutenant Commander Thomas A. Bergner and Lieutenant Mark S. Finke received a Letter of Appreciation from the Commanding Officer, U.S. Coast Guard Air Station, Borinquen, Puerto Rico, for their quick and professional response in the successful search and rescue operation in which they participated on November 13, 1984, at the request of the USCG.

Lieutenant (jg) Frank Migaiolo, GMCC South Pole Station Chief, received a Letter of Thanks from Dr. Robert E. Witkowski, Fellow Scientist, Westinghouse Electric Corporation, for his help and cooperation in setting up their experiment and the attentive care given the project throughout the winter 1983-84 season.

NOAA CORPS AWARDS

Over the past months, we have been working to upgrade the system of incentive awards for NOAA Corps officers. Through work with the Army's Institute of Heraldry and the Commerce Incentive Awards Board, the following items have been approved:

1. Adoption of a unique suspension medal (large and miniature), marked by a raised NOAA Corps emblem, for individual NOAA and NOAA Corps awards, to include the Administrator's Awards and Special Achievement Awards. (A service ribbon already exists for the NOAA Administrator's Award. See item 3 below.)
2. Adoption of a unique suspension medal (large and miniature), marked by a raised triangle, for the three existing Association of Commissioned Officer Awards. (See April 1984 NOAA Corps Bulletin and March 1984 ACO Newsletter.)
3. Authority to establish a new service ribbon for the NOAA Special Achievement Award (NOAA/DOC Sustained Superior Performance and Special Act or Service). (Reference: NOAA Personnel Handbook, Chapter 10 - Incentive Awards dated 6-23-80, Section 10-04.6.)
4. Authority to establish two new NOAA Corps honorary awards. (See attachment to this Bulletin for details):
 - a. NOAA Corps Commendation Medal (and Ribbon), and
 - b. NOAA Corps Director's Ribbon.
5. Authority to establish a unique suspension medal for the Department of Commerce gold, silver and bronze medals. (Service ribbons already exist.)

The creation of suspension medals will allow for the formal wear of all individual awards for which NOAA Corps officers are now eligible. Additionally, a revised order of precedence has been established incorporating all NOAA Corps medals and ribbons with those of the Armed Services.

All of the above information is included in Chapter 5 of the revised NOAA Corps Uniform Regulations that will be distributed in the spring of 1985.

The details of retroactivity for all of the above have yet to be established, but items 1, 2, 3 and 5 will generally be subject to some degree of retroactivity. You will be kept posted on this matter.

UNIFORM REGULATIONS

The NOAA Corps Uniform Regulations, 1985 revision, (NDM 56-68) is near completion and should be ready for distribution in early 1985. A summary of changes follows. Questions should be directed to Captain Burroughs (443-8950) or Lieutenant Henderson (443-8616).

1. Format: The Uniform Regulations will be published in a loose-leaf binder, allowing for easier periodic change.

2. Definitions: Definitions have been added to clarify the meaning of terms such as "authorized," "required," "prescribed" and "optional." The term "optional" is generally reserved for particular items of uniform wear rather than for a complete uniform.
3. Maternity Uniforms: A section stating which ones are available and when to wear them has been added.
4. Summer White: Summer White is authorized for wear as a summer uniform when prescribed by proper authority for certain geographic areas. It is approved for travel by commercial means.
5. Summer Blue (Salt and Pepper): Summer Blue is authorized for wear as a summer uniform when prescribed by proper authority for certain geographic areas. It is not approved for travel by commercial means or for wear on military bases.
6. Summer Khaki: Summer Khaki is a permanent press gabardine or Navy twill version of the cotton khakis presently worn aboard ship and is authorized for wear as a summer uniform when prescribed by proper authority for certain geographic areas. It is approved for travel by commercial means.
7. Working Khaki (Long & Short Sleeve): This is just a name change for the current shipboard khaki uniform. This uniform is intended for work situations.
8. Winter Blue (Black CPO Shirt): Winter Blue is authorized for wear as a winter uniform when prescribed by proper authority for certain geographic areas. It is approved for travel by commercial means.
9. Service Dress Blue (Bravo): Service Dress Blue (Bravo) is now the primary Corps uniform, suitable for travel.
10. Service Dress Blue (Alpha): The special circumstances for its wear are spelled out.
11. V-Neck Sweater: The use of the black, Army-style pullover sweater with Service Dress Blue (Bravo) is described.
12. Windbreaker: The use of both the Khaki and Navy Blue Windbreakers is described.
13. Formal Uniforms: Additional detail, especially concerning accessories, has been added.
14. Coveralls: Coveralls, especially aviation type, have been redefined.
15. Uniform Matrix: This has been revised to more clearly distinguish between individual items vice a particular uniform.
16. Commodore: Insignia are included for the commodore grade.
17. Medals, Ribbons, Awards: An order of precedence is established for all items for which NOAA Corps officers are eligible, including those items recognized by NOAA that are attributed to prior military service.

We are particularly appreciative of the dedicated efforts of Lieutenant Michael Henderson who, over this past year, has brought this major revision of the NOAA Corps Uniform Regulations closer to reality, along with past efforts by Lieutenant Donald Rice, Lieutenant Commander Richard Floyd and Lieutenant (jg) Elizabeth Steigerwald. Mrs. Fran Tabor has prepared the textual material.

SOCIAL SECURITY WAGE DEDUCTIONS

The 1985 deduction for social security will be 7.05 percent of \$39,600. No more than \$2,791.80 should be deducted from your pay for 1985.

CHAMPUS NEWS - NONAVAILABILITY STATEMENT RULES LIBERALIZED

It is now easier to have CHAMPUS share the cost of civilian health care without an eligible person's needing to get a nonavailability statement from the nearest military hospital.

A new Defense Department instruction states that, for service families who live within the zip code zone of a military hospital, CHAMPUS will help pay for nonemergency inpatient care from civilian doctors or hospitals without requiring the patient to have a nonavailability statement, if he or she also has a non-CHAMPUS health insurance policy that pays first for the cost of the medical services. Previously, the requirement for a nonavailability statement--a certification that the care needed was not available at the military hospital--was only lifted if a person's other insurance paid at least 75 percent of the major medical costs. The new policy is in effect for all CHAMPUS claims processed on or after October 1, 1984.

CHAMPUS, of course, pays after other health plans, except for Medicaid or insurance plans that are specifically designed as CHAMPUS supplemental policies.

Families who are eligible for CHAMPUS, but who live outside the zip code zone of the nearest service hospital, do not have to get nonavailability statements for inpatient civilian health care. Nonavailability statements will not be issued to people who are known to be ineligible for CHAMPUS or for medical services that CHAMPUS does not cover.

Family members who spend time abroad should remember that nonavailability statements issued by a military hospital outside the United States will not be valid for civilian care received within the U.S. Also, a nonavailability statement issued by a service hospital inside the U.S. will not be valid for care received in a civilian facility outside the country.

CHAMPUS CLAIMS PROCESSOR CHOSEN FOR SOUTHEAST STATES, CANADA, LATIN AMERICA

Military families in five Southeastern states, Puerto Rico, Canada, and Central and South America will have their CHAMPUS claims processed by Blue Cross-Blue Shield of South Carolina, beginning May 1, 1985.

The states in the CHAMPUS Southeast Region are Alabama, Florida, Georgia, Mississippi and Tennessee. The claims processing contract also covers Puerto Rico, Canada, Bermuda, the West Indies, Mexico, and Central and South America.

Families in these areas should continue to send claims to the current claims processor, Blue Shield of California, through April 30, 1985. Information about mailing addresses and toll-free telephone numbers for the new Southeast Region claims processor will be available soon.

The new \$3 million contract runs for 1 year, with four additional 1-year option periods. The contract contains incentives for Blue Cross-Blue Shield of South Carolina to perform well. This means that the firm will be subject to financial bonuses or penalties for speed and accuracy in paying claims. All CHAMPUS claims processors now operate under this type of contract.

Families should remember that claims go to the CHAMPUS processor for the state where they get medical care--no matter where they live.

CHAMPUS--the Civilian Health and Medical Program of the Uniformed Services--is the Defense Department's health benefit plan for military families who receive medical care from civilian hospitals and doctors. Private insurance companies, under contract with the government, process the claims through which CHAMPUS shares the cost of these medical bills.

CHAMPUS now has 6 stateside claims processing regions--a big improvement over the late 1970s, when there were nearly 90 separate processors across the country. Regionalization has helped cut claims processing costs, and has improved service to military families and to health care professionals who accept CHAMPUS assignment.

VETERANS ADMINISTRATION NEWS

Q. My husband recently died and I want to file for a widow's pension. Does it matter whether I wait until I get his estate settled or should I go ahead and file now?

A. The VA will need a report of your income and net worth to consider your claim. To establish the earliest possible effective date for pension, you should file your claim within 45 days of your husband's death. If you do not have complete information about your income and net worth at the time you file your claim, give your best estimate and state that it is an estimate. The VA regional office will notify you concerning the evidence you must submit to finalize your claim.

Q. I started receiving a VA pension this year. I recently received a questionnaire requesting information about my income and my medical expenses. I thought I was entitled to the pension because I am a veteran with wartime service. Why do they need information about my income?

A. Your eligibility for pension depends partly on your income. Each year the VA will mail you a request for income information which you must complete and return to verify your continuing eligibility for pension. If you have unexpected changes in income during the year, you should report these changes immediately to the VA.

VETERANS ADMINISTRATION - TRAINING ASSISTANCE

The Veterans Administration funds two major educational assistance programs for uniformed service members. These are: (1) the Vietnam-Era "G.I. Bill" for members who entered service before January 1, 1977, and (2) the Post-Vietnam-Era Veterans' Education Assistance Program (VEAP), for members who entered service after December 31, 1976. Both programs are discussed in the February 1984 Bulletin.

In the 1985 Department of Defense Authorization Act (H.R. 5167), Congress established a new 3-year educational assistance program. In exchange for a reduction in basic pay of \$100 per month for 12 months, new recruits entering a uniformed service after June 30, 1985, and before July 1, 1988, and serving 3 years will accrue an educational benefit of \$300 maximum per month for up to 36 months. The money an individual contributes is non-refundable. New members will be covered by this program unless they elect not to participate at the time they enter the service.

Q. How does this affect you?

A. If you are entitled to the "G.I. Bill"

The "G.I. Bill" under previous legislation expires December 31, 1989. To receive benefits after that date you must have: (1) unbroken service from the time you completed 181 or more days of active service establishing eligibility to "G.I. Bill" educational assistance, and (2) have remained on active duty for 3 years after July 1, 1985. After January 1, 1990, new basic benefits will be \$300 maximum per month plus one-half of your educational entitlement under the "G.I. Bill."

A. If you are entitled to VEAP

No new enrollment will be allowed under VEAP during the new 3-year educational assistance program--July 1, 1985 to June 30, 1988. You will not be eligible for the new program because it is for individuals who enter service after June 30, 1985. Therefore, if you wish to use VEAP you must initially enroll in VEAP before July 1, 1985. The Navy is urging Congress to allow individuals to enroll in VEAP after July 1, 1985, and to revise legislation to improve the situation. Several bills have been introduced in Congress to this effect.

I. APPROVED ASSIGNMENT CHANGES

NOAA CORPS COMMENDATION MEDAL

Purpose: Awarded to an officer who distinguishes himself or herself by heroic, meritorious or professional achievement or service. To merit this award, the acts or services must be accomplished or performed in a manner above that normally expected, be sufficient to distinguish the individual above those performing similar services and of such merit as to warrant more tangible recognition than is possible by a fitness report.

Type of Recognition: Honorary

Eligibility: Any member of the NOAA Corps

Selection Criteria:

1. For acts of heroism worthy of special recognition.
2. For meritorious achievement worthy of special recognition. The achievement should be such as to constitute a definite contribution to the service.
3. For meritorious service worthy of special recognition. This award may cover an extended period of time and is based on the circumstances under which the service was performed. The performance should be well above that usually expected of an individual commensurate in grade and experience.
4. For professional achievement that merits special recognition. This can include conferral of advanced degrees or honors (excludes Government-sponsored education), implementation of new processes or other contributions/achievements which enhance the missions of NOAA and the NOAA Corps and/or promote esprit de corps.
5. For leadership achievement which merits special recognition. Achievement must be sustained so as to demonstrate a high state of development; be of such merit as to earn singular recognition for the act(s); reflect most creditably on the efforts of the individual toward the accomplishment of the unit mission.

Nomination Procedures:

1. Initiated by any commissioned officer or supervisor for whom the officer works.
2. Forwarded to the Chief, Commissioned Personnel Division for initial screening.

Selection Procedure: Upon favorable review and recommendation by the Officer Personnel Board, the Director, NOAA Corps, approves.

Presentation: The Commendation Medal is rose gold, satin finish (flashed) suspended from a ribbon (color combination to be determined). The officer also receives a ribbon bar of the same design to be worn on the service uniform, a miniature medal suspended from a ribbon, and a certificate. The awarding authority is the Administrator, NOAA.

NOAA CORPS DIRECTOR'S RIBBON

Purpose: Awarded to an officer in recognition of noteworthy accomplishments in the performance of duty. This could include special contributions toward the attainment of program objectives, sustained above-average performance of duty, and/or high quality performance of duty over a relatively short period of time.

Type of Recognition: Honorary

Eligibility: Any member of the NOAA Corps

Selection Criteria:

1. An officer identified by praiseworthy accomplishment, set apart from others in the same or similar circumstances.
2. Determination of this distinction requires careful consideration of exactly what is or was expected as the ordinary, routine, or customary behavior and accomplishment for individuals of like rank and experience for the circumstances involved.

Nomination Procedure:

1. Initiated by any commissioned officer or supervisor for whom the officer works.
2. Forwarded to the Chief, Commissioned Personnel Division for initial screening.

Selection Procedure: Upon favorable review and recommendation by the Officer Personnel Board, the Director, NOAA Corps, approves.

Presentation: The Director's Ribbon (color combination to be determined)

FROM THE DIRECTOR'S DESK

The NOAA Corps is moving forward on an initiative to transfer the Corps' payroll processing (except for retired pay) from the Department of Commerce (DOC), Management Service Center, Germantown, Maryland, to the U.S. Coast Guard (USCG), Pay and Personnel Center, Topeka, Kansas. The transfer was initiated in conjunction with the proposed transfer of DOC's civilian payroll processing to the Department of Agriculture--a part of Reform 88. The present target date for the transfer to USCG is August 1985.

This action should provide improved service, with faster adjustments or changes to pay and entitlements. With this transfer, the NOAA Corps office will assume the role of central contact point for all Corps payroll matters. There will be some changes in the handling of pay and related matters, and you will be kept informed as the transfer progresses. The USCG system uses a management-by-exception concept. That is, an officer is on duty unless in a non-duty status. Therefore, officers will report all leave or non-duty status to the Commissioned Personnel Division (NCL) through their supervisors. Changes from current procedures will bring the Corps more in line with the payroll, travel, and leave operations of other uniformed services.

The NOAA Corps retired payroll will remain with the Navy Finance Office for the foreseeable future. The NC project manager for this initiative is Lieutenant Commander James Sarb.

UNIFORM OF THE DAY

Prescribed summer "Uniforms of the Day" for routine wear and the effective dates of change for the following major geographic areas are:

Washington, DC Area: Summer White - Effective May 6, 1985

Seattle, Washington Area: Summer Khaki - Effective May 6, 1985

Norfolk, Virginia Area: Summer Khaki - Effective April 29, 1985

Additional summer uniforms that are authorized and may be prescribed on certain occasions for all areas are: Service Dress Blue (Bravo); Service Dress Blue (Alpha); Service Dress White; Tropical White; Tropical Khaki, and Working Khaki (Short Sleeve).

Contrary to the announcement in last month's Bulletin, the Seattle area will not be prescribing Summer Blue (Salt and Pepper), and this uniform will be deleted from the list of authorized uniforms for the NOAA Corps.

HOMEOWNER'S DEDUCTIONS

The Internal Revenue Service (IRS) has not concluded its study on the question of whether members of the uniformed services are entitled, under current tax law, to take deductions on their income tax returns for home mortgage interest and property taxes to the extent they receive tax-free housing allowances (Basic Allowance for Quarters and Variable Housing Allowance). Therefore, the IRS has decided not to apply any determination on the issue to home mortgage interest and property taxes paid before January 1, 1987.

Previously, any determination would have been applied to home mortgage interest and property taxes paid after January 1, 1985. During this additional 2-year period, the Defense Department intends to prepare legislation to provide permanent protection of uniformed services homeowners' deductions.

CHANGE IN COAST GUARD CORRESPONDENCE COURSE PROCEDURES

A Coast Guard Institute change in procedures for administering end-of-course tests specifies that all tests must be administered before 23 March 1985 or be returned unadministered to the Institute. From now on, all end-of-course tests must be requested individually from the Institute and will be valid for only 90 days. The Coast Guard has informed all operating facilities of these new procedures.

NAVY CORRESPONDENCE COURSES

All Education Officers should obtain a supply of the new application form for ordering Navy Correspondence Courses, which can be ordered in quantities of 50. The title and number is: Correspondence Course Enrollment Application/Change Form, NAVEDTRA 1510/1 (6/84). Requests should be sent to: Department of the Navy, Naval Education & Training Program Development Center, Pensacola, FL 32559-5000.

LEGAL ASSISTANCE

The Department of the Navy, Office of the Judge Advocate General (JAG), has reaffirmed the provision that legal assistance services are available to eligible NOAA Corps officers on a space-available basis, subject to JAG legal staff resources.

DINERS CLUB GOVERNMENT CHARGE CARD

NOAA is participating in the Government-sponsored Diners Club Government Charge Card program that has reduced travel advance cash accounts by 20 percent.

Officers using the card pay for their routine travel expenses such as transportation, lodging, car rentals and meals and are billed later at their home address for those expenses incurred during TDY. Reimbursement is made promptly after submitting travel vouchers to the appropriate finance office.

Some of the advantages of the card include: no-cost \$150,000 travel accident insurance, no-cost lost and delayed baggage insurance, 24-hour lost card replacement, no annual fee, and no personal credit check.

An officer who meets any one of the following criteria can receive a card by filling out an application form (obtained from contacts listed below) and by sending it directly to the NOAA coordinator, Jo Ann Kissal, who will send the card to your home address.

1. Officers who plan to make two or more trips per year,
2. Officers at the branch chief level and above,
3. Officers whose official duty stations are located outside the United States,
4. Officers in field locations with limited or no access to Travel Management Centers, Scheduled Airline Ticket Offices (SATO), and/or imprest funds, and
5. Officers who are required to perform emergency travel on short notice and may be notified to travel during off-duty hours.

IN MEMORIAM

CAPTAIN WALTER JOSEPH CHOVAN, NOAA (RET.)
February 22, 1900 - February 10, 1985

Captain Walter J. Chovan was born February 22, 1900, at Pittsburgh, Pennsylvania. He attended the University of California at Berkeley and received a bachelor of science degree in Civil Engineering on May 13, 1925. After his graduation, he was appointed as a deck officer on July 27, 1925, and was commissioned as an ensign in the U.S. Coast and Geodetic Survey on August 11, 1926.

During Captain Chovan's 34-year career, he was assigned aboard the LYDONIA, EXPLORER, DISCOVERER, SURVEYOR, PIONEER, PATHFINDER as Executive Officer, PARKER as Commanding Officer; the HYDROGRAPHER as Executive Officer, and at the time of his retirement (3/1/59) as Commanding Officer. His other assignments included Wire Drag Party, Air Photo Compilation, Triangulation and the Southern District Headquarters in New Orleans, Louisiana as Supervisor.

On February 24, 1942, Captain Chovan was transferred to the service and jurisdiction of the Navy Department. While serving with the Navy he was given a temporary promotion to lieutenant commander and later to commander. On February 17, 1945, he returned to the jurisdiction of the USC&GS. While with the Navy, Captain Chovan was aboard the PATHFINDER, which served in the South Pacific. The ship was commended for its assistance on April 7, 1943, when a heavy air attack was made by the Japanese on U.S. ships in the Solomon Island area. The PATHFINDER was in the area at the time. In commenting on this action the Commander in Chief, Pacific Fleet stated:

"The performance of PATHFINDER on 7 April is noteworthy. Preceding the attack, this vessel was conducting survey operations off Berande Point, Guadalcanal. Despite warning of approaching planes and the departure of most of our large ships from the area, her personnel continued hydrography until enemy planes were near. Leaving her ship's boats with one quarter of the crew at their assigned survey duties, the commanding officer then went to maximum speed and maneuvered close aboard AARON WARD. Two planes dived her and were shot down. Her boats brought off wounded from AARON WARD who were cared for on board during the night. Early next morning these men were disembarked by hospitalization and at 0700, 8 April local time 'the ship resumed its survey operations.' It is a pleasure to report on the efficient and business-like conduct of duty under fire of the USC&GS ship operating under my command."

He was awarded the American Defense Service Medal, the American Area Campaign Medal, the Asiatic-Pacific Campaign Medal, and the Victory Medal for the period of 12/7/41 to 2/23/42.

Captain Chovan is survived by his wife of 57 years, Almeda K. and one daughter Janet C. Davis.

IN MEMORIAM

CAPTAIN ROBERT WHITNEY FRANKLIN, NOAA (RET.)

May 23, 1935 - February 4, 1985

Captain Robert W. Franklin was born May 23, 1935, at Winthrop, Massachusetts. Following receipt of a bachelor of science degree in Civil Engineering at the Worcester Polytechnic Institute in Worcester, Massachusetts, he was commissioned as an ensign in the U.S. Coast and Geodetic Survey on June 25, 1957.

Captain Franklin's 20-year career included duty aboard four ships, an air facilities location party, a geodetic triangulation party, and the Louisiana low-water-line tides party; as command pilot of three different aerial photography missions, as Chief of Flight Operations in the Photogrammetry Division, as Chief of the Anchorage Field Office, and as Officer in Charge of the Miami Ship and Ocean Engineering Facility. His assignments at sea included duty as Executive Officer aboard PATTON, PEIRCE, SURVEYOR and RESEARCHER and as Commanding Officer of the RESEARCHER from which he retired on July 1, 1977.

Captain Franklin received numerous commendations for performance of duty, including commendation from the Director, Coast and Geodetic Survey, for his impressive record of accomplishment as Chief, Air Photo Mission I, and for his work in the rescue of the survivors of an airplane crash in Alaska.

Awards bestowed upon Captain Franklin included the Karo Award for his work on the Louisiana low-water-line survey, the Department of Commerce Bronze Medal in recognition of his untiring efforts and outstanding ability as Officer in Charge of the Miami Ship and Ocean Engineering Facility, and a NOAA Unit Citation for the performance of his command of the NOAA Ship RESEARCHER.

He is survived by his mother, Irene Peterson Brooks, two brothers and one sister.

FROM THE DIRECTOR'S DESK

The Officer Personnel Board conducted its annual review of the Lineal List in late March. Recommendations of the board are currently under review, and we will report on results next month. In addition, we convened a Flag board in March to review the Captain list. This Bulletin includes a discussion of that review including the listing of a number of personal growth elements considered desirable for all officers. Please note these aspects as you plan your career development.

SPECIAL RECOGNITION

Rear Admiral John D. Bossler was installed as president of the American Congress on Surveying and Mapping at their 45th annual business meeting on March 13, 1985.

Rear Admiral John D. Bossler, Commander Lewis Lapine and Lieutenant George E. Leigh received citations for exceptional service from outgoing president Lawrence F. Ayers at the annual American Congress on Surveying and Mapping awards meeting on March 13, 1985.

Commander Abram Y. Bryson, Jr. received a Letter of Commendation from the Atlantic Marine Center, Federal Women's Program Manager for his outstanding involvement with the Federal Women's Program and the success of the Federal Women's Program Week.

Lieutenant David J. Kruth received a "well done" from the Commanding Officer, U.S. Coast Guard, Marine Safety Office in Miami, Florida, for his professional expertise while acting as Captain of the Port, Scientific Support Coordinator, during the period January 20-24, 1985. FLAG BOARD REVIEW OF CAPTAIN LIST

On March 4, 1985, a Flag Board was convened and reviewed the performance and personnel records of all captains with more than 1 year of 0-6 service. This review was made to determine if the Corps was maintaining the professional, managerial and technical skills needed by NOAA. The Board considered the role of the Corps, as NOAA adapts to a general shift from an industrial to an information society, and agreed that the Corps must accommodate this change and maintain a system of highly-qualified officers with the leadership and staffing abilities to perform the Corps' mission. The Board further defined the broad promotion criteria in NDM 56-46 and selected the following rating elements desirable for all senior officers to develop.

1. LEADERSHIP - The process of inspiring people to accomplish organizational goals. This is marked by active involvement in the successful management of projects and programs. This success is measured by both short-term and long-term organizational results.
2. STAFFING EXPERIENCE - The quality of experience gained through investigating, researching, and advising line managers in the areas of policy and programs, headquarters planning, and management and budget. The value of this experience is measured by the organizational level and breadth of the staff positions. Staff college or equivalent training is invaluable.
3. PROFESSIONALISM - The active involvement in professions related to NOAA's mission. This is marked by: (1) registration, licenses, and certifications in appropriate fields, (2) active participation in professional societies, (3) the presentation of speeches and papers, and (4) active participation in symposia, workshops, and professional meetings.
4. TECHNICAL COMPETENCE - The ability to be a technical leader in a field. Evidence is displayed by: (1) published papers, (2) continuing education to stay abreast of new methodologies and techniques, (3) advanced degrees, and (4) accomplished technical projects. This includes both management and operational sciences.
5. NOAA PROMINENCE - The officer's reputation as determined by initiative and accomplishments. This is influenced by the degree to which the officer furthers opportunities to develop a good reputation with constituents, fellow employees, and higher management.
6. PERFORMANCE - The general summation of an officer's performance as reflected in fitness reports. The rated factors (Job Ability, Job Accomplishment, etc.) are the most significant parts of this element. Fitness reports from sea assignments have a high weight; however, a good mix of management, research, and staffing is also important.

Although instructed to review Captains with 3 years or more of 0-6 service, the Board decided to look at all Captains with at least 1 year. Each officer was then rated on a scale of 1 to 5 for each rating element. While the Board noted a fairly wide variation in the group among the elements rated, it did not make recommendations for either commendatory or adverse specific actions. The Director, NOAA Corps, has advised each officer of his relative development in each of the elements as well as an overall standing in the group, so that individual career development can be considered.

PAYROLL PROCESSING UPDATE

A recent visit to the Management Service Center (MSC) uncovered two recurring situations regarding Time and Attendance cards (Form 36-22). First, a number of timekeepers are erroneously submitting the timecards for officers showing a pay period total of 16 days for the second pay period of a 31-day month. This report can result in the overpayment of salary and a subsequent collection action. The procedures for properly reporting an officer's duty/leave activity are described in Part III, Chapter 02, Section 03 of the NOAA Timekeepers' Handbook.

The second situation is the reporting of Dive Pay on the timecard for the first pay period of the month. The Chief, Payroll Section, MSC, has reminded us that the proper procedure for reporting Dive Pay is a single entry for the month, made on the timecard for the second half of the month. This procedure is published in NDM 56-50, paragraph 14. Any entry for Dive Pay on the timecard for the first half of the month will be ignored by the system.

The Form 36-22 is an important document. Any discrepancies or errors can adversely affect pay and entitlements. Each officer should ensure that his or her timecard is accurate and complete. A review of your timecard will prevent errors and help speed up the processing operations at MSC.

NOAA CORPS ANNIVERSARY

The 68th Anniversary Celebration of the Commissioned Corps will be marked by an Annual Dinner Dance on Saturday evening, May 25, 1985. It will be held at the Manor Country Club in Rockville, Maryland. Invitations have been sent out by the Director, NOAA Corps, and the Association of Commissioned Officers. It will be a black-tie affair, and the uniform will be Dinner Dress Blue Jacket or Dinner Dress Blue for O-4 and below. CONTINUING EDUCATION

NOAA Directives Manual 56-46 lists the minimum continuing education requirements to qualify professionally for promotion. From the beginning of their career, officers should participate in training courses such as Basic Supervision, Supervision and Group Performance, The Supervisor and Equal Employment Opportunity, the Federal Procurement Process, etc., in addition to the technical courses needed to stay current in the officer's field of expertise and to develop the technical skills required in the various billets.

Education should be a continuing process. As experience and grade increase, the level of supervisory/management training should also increase. Knowledge of the Federal process is critical. Senior officers should understand the requirements of the budgetary and financial management systems, the functions of the Executive Branch, and the role of Congressional oversight. Officers must keep up with constantly changing Federal policies and procedures.

The Director of the NOAA Corps will resolve any individual questions regarding the wearing and precedence of decorations, medals, awards, ribbons, or badges not listed above.

VARIABLE HOUSING ALLOWANCE

The 1 January 1985 NOAA Corps Bulletin announced several changes to Variable Housing Allowance (VHA). With reference to the second of the three cases stated, a recent review has established two circumstances when VHA can be paid for the member's dependent's location in lieu of the member's permanent duty station.

Officers assigned to CONUS duty stations will be authorized VHA at the rate of the location of dependents, when requested, if:

1. The dependents occupy non-government quarters at a designated place when the officer is assigned to a ship designated as arduous sea duty.
2. The dependents occupy non-government quarters at a designated place when the officer is assigned to Indeterminate Temporary Duty Status (mobile field duty).

The designated place VHA rate will be effective on the date of arrival of one or more dependents at the location of the new residence or the date that the member reports to the new permanent station in connection with the transfer, whichever is later.

VETERANS ADMINISTRATION NEWS

Q. The Veterans Administration recently rated me 100 percent service-connected disabled. I am a military retiree. Is there an advantage to waiving my military retirement pay in order to receive VA compensation?

A. Yes, if your military retirement pay is based on length of service rather than on disability. VA compensation for a service-connected disability is tax exempt, while military retirement pay based on length of service is not.

Q. I am a veteran receiving military service retirement pay in lieu of VA compensation. I have a VA home loan pending. Will I have to pay the funding fee?

A. No. The law specifically exempts veterans receiving compensation, and those who receive retirement pay in lieu of such compensation, from payment of the fee.

Agreements for the voluntary withholding of state tax from retired pay have been reached with Maryland, Oklahoma, Maine, New Mexico, Utah, Alabama, North Carolina, South Carolina and Minnesota effective June 1, 1985, and Indiana and Kansas effective July 1, 1985. If you are a retired resident of these states and wish to have state tax withheld, write to:

Your letter must show the exact amount to be withheld. The withholding can only be in even dollar increments and for a minimum of ten dollars (\$10).

Retired pay of uniformed service members is not taxable in Pennsylvania and West Virginia. We will advise you as other state agreements are made.

IN MEMORIAM

CAPTAIN LEONARD SARGENT HUBBARD, NOAA (RET.)
May 22, 1896 - March 9, 1985

Captain Leonard S. Hubbard was born May 22, 1896, at Glastonbury, Connecticut. He attended Tufts College, Medford, Massachusetts, and graduated in June 1923 with a bachelor of science degree in civil engineering. Following graduation, he was appointed as deck officer and on March 14, 1924, he was commissioned as ensign.

His 33-year career included the following ship assignments: DISCOVERER; SURVEYOR, first as a topographer, later as Watch Officer and finally as Executive Officer; LYDONIA; PIONEER; EXPLORER, first as Watch Officer and Gunnery/Communications Officer and later as Executive Officer; and HYDROGRAPHER as Commanding Officer. Other assignments included various Field Party positions and Chief of Party, Assistant to Officer in Charge at the Seattle Processing Office, Inspector for the field station in San Francisco, Supervisor for the Northeastern District in Boston, Chief of the Hydrography Branch, Division of Coastal Surveys at Headquarters, and at the time of his retirement on June 1, 1956, as Supervisor to the Northwestern District in Seattle.

Captain Hubbard was awarded a World War II, Certificate of Service, stating that he "honorably served as a commissioned officer of the U.S. Coast and Geodetic Survey on projects for the Department of the Navy in areas determined by the Department of the Navy to be of immediate military hazard as contemplated by Section 2 of Public Law 786, 77th Congress, from 24 March 1942 to 1 September 1945."

Captain Hubbard is survived by his three children, Harold A. Hubbard, Florence L. Hodges and Alice H. Stallings.

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LIEUTENANT COMMANDER DONALD LEE CAMPBELL, NOAA (RET.)
August 28, 1928 - March 20, 1985

Lieutenant Commander Donald L. Campbell was born August 28, 1928, at Santa Fe, New Mexico. He attended the University of New Mexico and graduated with a bachelor of science degree in civil engineering in June 1951. Following graduation, he was appointed as deck officer and on December 15, 1951, was commissioned as ensign.

During his career, he served aboard the following ships: EXPLORER; HYDROGRAPHER; GILBERT, as Executive Officer and later as Commanding Officer; and SCOTT as Commanding Officer. His other assignments included Geodesy, Triangulation and an East Coast Field Party. He was placed on the Temporary Disability Retired List (TDRL) on October 5, 1960, and was recalled to active duty the next day. While on recall he served aboard EXPLORER and WAINWRIGHT and was assigned to the Norfolk District Office and to Headquarters, Washington, D.C. He was again placed on the TDRL on August 23, 1961, and on the Permanent Disability Retired List on August 1, 1966.

Lieutenant Commander Campbell is survived by his two children, Lorel L. and Kevin S. Campbell.

ASSOCIATION OF COMMISSIONED OFFICER (ACO) 1984 AWARDS

From the outstanding group of nominees this year, the ACO has made the following awards:

Lieutenant Commander Kenneth M. Holden II received the ACO Engineering Award for his academic excellence and outstanding research in mechanical engineering while at the Naval Postgraduate School. He evaluated a series of polymer coatings for their ability to sustain dropwise condensation of steam. His results indicated that through the use of polymer coatings, the condensing capability of a surface can be increased. He published the results of his research and gave a presentation to the American Society of Mechanical Engineers, Winter Annual Meeting, in New Orleans, December 1984.

He received a letter of commendation on his outstanding performance from Vice Admiral E. B. Fowler, Commander, Naval Sea Systems Command, was awarded the Naval Sea Systems Command Award for Excellence in Naval Engineering, and was offered an associated membership into Sigma Xi, The Scientific Research Society.

In addition, he received his Professional Engineer's License in Mechanical Engineering from the State of California, and is listed in Who's Who in American Colleges and Universities, 1984.

Lieutenant (junior grade) Robert G. Bill received the ACO Science Award based on his research on lobster physiology while with the National Marine Fisheries Service. The research studied the effects of hydrocarbon and heavy metal contamination in dump site areas on selected marine life, namely, flounder, mussels, and lobsters. Results indicated that the response of lobsters to water-borne pollutants is a practical tool for monitoring sub-lethal levels of these irritants.

Four papers were published in international journals as a result of his research, and a presentation was made to the New England Estuarine Research Society Fall Meeting, Narragansett, R.I., October 1984.

Lieutenant (junior grade) Thomas A. Wolf received the ACO Junior Officer of the Year Award for his sustained superior performance while in the NOAA Ship WHITING and in the Hydrographic Surveys Branch, Atlantic Marine Center (AMC). While in the WHITING as Operations Officer, he coordinated the logistics involved with an international project and planned the 1984 Bahamas survey. After his transfer to AMC, he was responsible for the rapid and efficient implementation of the Survey Tracking and Reporting System.

He received the 1984 AMC Junior Officer of the Year Award, and is president of the Norfolk ACO.

IN MEMORIAM

CAPTAIN ECTOR BROOKS LATHAM, NOAA (RET.)
November 23, 1900 - May 17, 1985

Captain Ector B. Latham was born November 23, 1900, at Rockton, South Carolina. He graduated from the University of Maryland with a bachelor of science degree in civil engineering in June 1924. He was appointed as deck officer on June 5, 1925, and later was commissioned as ensign on March 8, 1926.

During his 32-year career, Captain Latham served aboard the NOAA Ships EXPLORER, SURVEYOR, HYDROGRAPHER, first as Watch Officer and later as Commanding Officer, the COWIE as Commanding Officer, the PIONEER as Executive Officer, and his last sea assignment as Commanding Officer, NOAA Ship BOWIE. His other assignments included Geodesy, working in the East and Midwest, Washington, D.C., Potomac River, Mountain States, and Florida; Hydrography and Triangulation in New York; and, at the time of his retirement on October 1, 1957, the Midwestern District in Portland, Oregon.

Captain Latham was transferred to the jurisdiction of the War Department on September 3, 1942. He received several commendations. His commendation from Headquarters Second Engineer Special Brigade stated: "Major Ector B. Latham, K-100025, 532d Engineer Boat and Shore Regiment, is commended for his outstanding services during the development of the Finschhafen, New Guinea area from 22 September 1943 to 15 November 1943. At night and under adverse weather conditions, Major Latham piloted Naval and Brigade craft through uncharted and dangerous waters without mishap. He personally navigated the majority of early resupply missions from Lae to Scarlet Beach and Finsch Harbor. He displayed rare courage and coolness under enemy fire, always being an example to the officers and men under his command. In addition, Major Latham has prepared detailed hydrographic surveys for Finsch Harbor, Langemak Bay, Schneider and Dreger Harbors."

During this time he was awarded the Purple Heart for injuries received in action north of Saidor, New Guinea, on March 6, 1944. He was authorized to wear the Phillipine Liberation Ribbon and two Bronze Stars, the World War II Victory Medal, the Asiatic Pacific Campaign Medal with two Bronze Stars and a Bronze Arrowhead.

He is survived by his wife, Grace, and one daughter, Lucy Anne Hauser.

Enclosed with this issue of the Bulletin is a copy of the Veterans Administration booklet Federal Benefits for Veterans and Dependents dated January 1985.

UNIFORMS

The women's black cross tie available at the Merchant Marine Academy, Kings Point is out-of-stock indefinitely. Women officers may wear the Navy-style black necktie (bow tie) until an alternate supplier for the cross tie is found.

INSIGNIA

Chief-of-Party - A distinctive insignia design has been delivered to the Institute of Heraldry for use in a prototype. The proposed insignia will be a raised triangle, worn with point upward. Estimated availability date is early 1986. Awarding of insignia will be retroactive.

Command-at-Sea - Commanding Officers of all Class 1 through Class 5 Vessels are now authorized to wear the Command-at-Sea Insignia. This will include the FERREL and CHAPMAN in addition to those previously authorized commands. The Small-Craft-Command Insignia is authorized for those commanding officers and OICs of vessels greater than 50 feet in length up through Class 6. This will provide for recognition of the OICs of high-speed launches. Chapter 04-02 of the NOAA Corps Uniform Regulations has been revised accordingly. (Reprinted from the April 1982 Bulletin.)

TAX WITHHOLDING - RETIRED PAY

Agreements for the voluntary withholding of state tax from retired pay have been reached with Alabama, Maine, Maryland, Minnesota, New Mexico, North Carolina, Oklahoma, South Carolina, and Utah effective June 1, 1985; Indiana, Kansas, and Wisconsin effective July 1, 1985; Delaware, Georgia, Idaho and Massachusetts, effective August 1, 1985; and Arkansas effective January 1, 1986. If you are a retired resident of these states and wish to have state tax withheld, write to:

Your letter must show the exact amount to be withheld. The withholding can only be in even dollar increments and for a minimum of ten dollars (\$10).

Retired pay of uniformed service members is not taxable in Pennsylvania and West Virginia. We will advise you as other state agreements are made.

PER DIEM COMPUTATION CHANGE

The method of computing per diem for uniformed service travel under the Joint Travel Regulations has been revised. The major revision eliminates the rounding up of the average lodging amount. The average cost of lodging (not rounded to the next dollar) will be added to the fixed amount (\$23.00) for meals and incidentals. This method is also used in foreign travel per diem computation, except that the fixed amount will be 46 percent of the maximum per diem rate for the locality. See example below:

Two days' lodging costs of \$24.00
+ 28.12
\$52.12 = average cost of \$26.06
fixed rate: + 23.00
per diem rate: \$49.06 x 2 days = \$98.12

FROM THE DIRECTOR'S DESK

It has been gratifying to receive numerous, favorable comments from a wide range of NOAA officers, supervisors, and constituents regarding a generally enhanced image projected by the NOAA Corps as a uniformed service. The image is one of professionalism, high technical and ethical standards, and individual pride in duty. Much of this positive image has been characterized as an overall improvement in personal uniform standards and through increased wearing of the uniform in a greater range of shoreside billets. One of the comments made by most of us at one time or another is that "the Corps is so small and unknown that we constantly run into people who don't know about us." This, of course, may always be true in some places, but I am encouraged that in many areas this aspect is changing.

But, can we do more? I believe we can! Current policy specifies all officers when on duty will be in uniform at least once-a-week and more frequently in some commands and billets. Encouraged that this policy has brought fairly widespread benefits to the Corps, to NOAA and others, I am now extending the policy to provide that all officers will wear the uniform a majority of the time when on duty. I am aware that there are some days when non-uniform wear will be preferred, and this policy accommodates those situations. I know of very few billets that may require total exception, and certainly they will be considered, if valid. Please let me know. The new chapter on Commissioned Officers - Uniforms, NDM 56-68, will soon be published and will further discuss this matter.

PAYROLL PROCESSING - STATUS

The reimbursable agreement between the National Oceanic and Atmospheric Administration (NOAA), Department of Commerce, and the United States Coast Guard (USCG), Department of Transportation, for the processing of active-duty NOAA commissioned officers personnel and payroll data by the USCG was signed on August 1, 1985.

Commissioned Personnel Division (NC1) has installed the local hardware required for entering personnel and payroll data into the USCG system through a telephone to the USCG Pay and Personnel Center at Topeka, Kansas, and is rapidly loading the data required to start the NOAA Corps payroll on the USCG system.

Our goal is to start payment through the USCG system in October 1985. Before that can happen, we must load all required data and achieve a successful parallel run of the Management Service Center (MSC) and USCG systems in September.

Some of the changes you will see under the new system are: (1) No check will be sent to a home address; you should apply for "Direct Deposit" or your check will be sent to the designated agent for your unit; (2) the "white card" you now receive each payday will be replaced by a Leave and Earnings Statement (LES) issued once per month that will show each element of pay separately--the amount of the mid-month payment, the end of month payment, and the forecast for the next month's two payments; (3) the check will be in whole dollars with the remaining cents being carried forward to the next month;

(4) the LES will show all activity on your pay account during the month; (5) payday will be the 15th and last days of the month with no delay; time cards will no longer be used; (6) annual leave, diving and other such reports will be sent to NCI via your supervisor; (7) your pay records will be maintained by NCI; all entries to the payroll system will be made by NCI; some USCG forms will be used instead of NOAA forms.

The leave balance maintained by MSC (shown on your white card) will be entered into the USCG system. If there is any difference between your Time and Attendance Report balance and the white card balance, it is recommended that a leave audit be performed to reconcile the difference. Forward written notification of any adjustment through your supervisor to MSC Payroll Section for entry into the MSC system. A subsequent adjustment will be made to the USCG balance to insure a complete and accurate leave record.

A number of underpayments and overpayments to officers have been discovered in the course of preparing the USCG database. Regardless of the source of the error, it is the officer's responsibility to notify either MSC or NCI of any actual or suspected irregularity in their pay. Ignoring an overpayment will only generate bad feelings when a collection notification is issued.

The last check issued by MSC will contain any balance in your U.S. Savings Bond allotment account if not sufficient for purchase of the specified bond. Deductions for bond purchases will begin anew under the USCG system.

Additional information and instructions will be sent to each officer shortly. In the meantime, you are encouraged to sign up for "Direct Deposit" if you have not already done so. USCG uses electronic fund transfer that puts your pay in your account at a financial institution (no matter where you may be at the time). Form 1199A (Rev. 1-78) or form 1199A (Rev. 7-84) should be filled out by you and the financial institution and forwarded to NCI.

Please note that the retired payroll system will not be changed and will continue to be administered through the Navy Finance Center.

TAX WITHHOLDING - RETIRED PAY

Agreements for the voluntary withholding of state tax from retired pay have been reached with Alabama, Maine, Maryland, Minnesota, New Mexico, North Carolina, Oklahoma, South Carolina and Utah effective June 1, 1985; Indiana, Kansas, and Wisconsin effective July 1, 1985; Delaware, Georgia, Idaho and Massachusetts, effective August 1, 1985; Virginia effective September 1, 1985; and Arkansas effective January 1, 1986. If you are a retired resident of these states and wish to have state tax withheld, write to:

Your letter must show the exact amount to be withheld. The withholding can only be in even dollar increments and for a minimum of ten dollars (\$10).

Retired pay of uniformed service members is not taxable in Pennsylvania and West Virginia. We will advise you as other state agreements are made.

If you do not call the above telephone numbers within 72 hours, you take a chance that your bills will not be paid.

Therefore, emergency care must be reported to the PHS within 72 hours by anyone on your behalf if you are unable to make the call.

NOAA CORPS TRAVEL REGULATIONS

The Joint Travel Regulation Volume #1 will be superseded in June 1986 by the Joint Federal Travel Regulation - Uniformed Service Volume. Although basic entitlements will remain unchanged this new regulation will be in a different format and organization. To ease implementation of the new regulation this office plans to publish a NOAA Corps Travel Directive that will define (or) promulgate NOAA unique policies and procedures. We need your help! As the field elements that ultimately use the Directive, what travel issues would you like to have in the new NDM? Remember we are trying to further explain already existing policy, not change or create new policy. The basic provisions in the JTR or JFTR will remain the same.

MILITARY AIRLIFT COMMAND (MAC) FLIGHT ASSISTANCE

The following information is provided for those NOAA Corps officers who are still being questioned about eligibility for "Space-A" flights at MAC terminals. If the terminal personnel are not aware of NOAA's eligibility, have them call the U.S. Air Force (USAF) Operations Center, Transportation Duty Officer, on Autovon 225-7220 (commercial 202-695-7220). Before calling, make sure all of the requirements such as leave slips, proper uniform, grooming, etc., have been met. If the situation still cannot be resolved, call Mr. Dan Leary, Military Airlift Command, on Autovon 227-9560 (commercial 202-697-9560) as a last resort. The revised USAF Regulation (4515.13R) that includes references to NOAA Corps ID cards, leave forms, etc., should be distributed to MAC terminals by the fall of this year.

Travel orders accountable to this Office are identified by organization codes AN0000, AN1000 or AN2000 (preceded by a fiscal year indicator) in block 10 of the Commissioned Officer's Travel Order (form 56-1). Note that the Office of the NOAA Corps is the only organization authorized to approve expenditures under these codes.

VETERANS ADMINISTRATION NEWS

Q. Ten years ago I renounced my VA disability compensation, and it was terminated. Can I make a new application for this same disability?

A. Yes. A renouncement does not preclude a person from filing a new application. However, no payment may be made for any period prior to the date the application is received by the VA.

Q. I joined the Service after January 1, 1977, and I am not eligible for the old GI Bill nor am I enrolled in VEAP. Am I eligible for the new GI Bill?

A. No. The only option for anyone who enlisted in the military after January 1, 1977, or one who will enlist prior to July 1, 1985, is VEAP. In order to have educational benefits of any kind, one must enroll in VEAP prior to June 30, 1985.

Q. I am eligible for the old GI Bill. Will I lose any of my benefits?

A. No, if anything, you can gain more educational benefits. If you have no break in service since December 31, 1976, continue to serve 3 years beyond June 30, 1985, are other than dishonorably discharged after July 1, 1988, and have remaining entitlements, then you can receive the basic benefits of the old GI Bill through December 31, 1989, and after that date, you can receive up to one-half of benefits payable under the old GI Bill in addition to benefits under the new GI Bill.

Q. My service-connected disability has increased in severity, and I can no longer work. Am I entitled to assistance for retraining?

A. You may be entitled to vocational rehabilitation and counseling to help you find and be trained for a suitable vocation.

Q. I have a Veterans Administrative Government Life Insurance policy and also receive VA disability compensation. I often worry about forgetting to pay my premiums. To avoid this possibility can my premiums be deducted from my compensation payments?

A. Yes. Deduction of premiums from your compensation check can be established by completing an Insurance Deduction Authorization and mailing it to the VA Insurance Center. You can obtain this form from your nearest VA office.

Q. I am a disabled veteran with special adaptive equipment on my present car paid for by the VA. Can I purchase a second car and have it equipped in the same manner?

A. Yes, a recent change in regulations permits you to have two cars with special adaptive equipment.

IN MEMORIAM

FREEL "HUBB" HUBBARD
May 7, 1915 - June 25, 1985

Mr. Hubbard was born in Alberta, Canada, and attended high school and college in Hebron, Nebraska. He began his Federal career shortly after he served his country in the U.S. Marine Corps in 1944 and 1945. He was a unique civil servant in that he began his career as a Recorder with the Coast and Geodetic Survey on May 29, 1946, and served C&GS and its successor organizations until his retirement December 31, 1977. During that time, he distinguished himself by his record of unselfish and dedicated service in the field of Personnel Management, including serving as Personnel Officer for the Pacific Marine Center, Seattle, Washington.

His record is replete with examples of extremely competent performance, demonstrated by no fewer than 12 letters of commendation; he received several performance awards: the NOAA Elmer G. Neuman Award in 1976 for his expertise in labor relations, and the Department of Commerce Bronze Medal in 1975. He was widely recognized and respected by those who worked for and with him. He had a penchant for inspirational leadership and the capacity to inspire loyalty and friendship.

Perhaps the most eloquent and sincere testimonial is contained in a 1973 memorandum from Admiral Norman E. Taylor who had an association with Hubb spanning 25 years: "I know of no individual who is more respected and sought after for solutions to our waterfront problems than yourself....Your expertise in this field (labor management relations) is second to none and has been regularly relied upon for management decisions. I have never known a Personnel Officer who was as respected, trusted, or as well liked as yourself. Your reputation is known and respected throughout the Agency."

He is survived by his wife, Edna, and one son Duane.

Mr. Melby was born in Ione, Washington, and was employed for 38 years in the Government. CHAMPUS NEWS

New Claims Processor for South Carolina - A reminder: As of September 1, 1985, Wisconsin Physicians Service began processing CHAMPUS claims for service families who receive health care in South Carolina. The mailing address for claims is: Wisconsin Physicians Service/CHAMPUS, P.O. Box 8965, Madison, Wisconsin 53708. CHAMPUS families who have questions about claims for care from civilian sources in South Carolina can call Wisconsin Physicians Service toll-free at 1-800-356-5954. Avoid calling on Mondays and Fridays, as the telephone lines are busiest on those days.

Your CHAMPUS Deductible Starts Over on Oct. 1 - Remember that on October 1, your CHAMPUS deductible for outpatient care starts over for the coming year. This means that, from October 1, 1985, through September 30, 1986, you pay the first \$50 (for one person) or the first \$100 (for a family) worth of allowable outpatient medical bills. Send in your claims as you normally do, and the CHAMPUS claims processor for your state or region will keep track until you've met your deductible amount for the year. If you have other insurance that pays part of your outpatient bills, send in their statement showing how much they paid. That counts toward your deductible, too.

Update on Eye Exams for Active-Duty Families - The recent CHAMPUS announcement about a new eye examination benefit for members of active-duty families (one eye exam per person, per calendar year) asked everyone not to submit claims to CHAMPUS contract claims processors until the end of June. This was to allow the firms time to establish their procedures and computer programs for handling claims on this new benefit.

Not all processors were able to begin accepting claims for eye exams by the end of June, but all will have procedures in place by mid-September. So, if you have an eye exam claim that came back to you, or one that hasn't been sent in yet, go ahead and mail it in.

Claims for percutaneous lithotripsy and extracorporeal shock wave lithotripsy can be filed to their geographical claims processor as of September 16, 1985. This became a benefit as of March 15, 1985.

Be Sure To Respond Rapidly - Sometimes when a CHAMPUS claims processor receives a claim, it doesn't contain all the necessary facts needed for processing (most-frequent omissions: social security numbers and signatures). The processor will write or call you and ask for the needed information.

Be sure to respond to the request for information within 35 days of the date of the request, or your claim may be rejected.

VETERANS ADMINISTRATION NEWS

Q. I requested and received a refund of the contributions I made to the education program while I was in the service. Now that I am out of the service I have changed my mind and want to go to college. Can I pay back the money I withdrew?

A. No. Once your contributions are withdrawn after your release from the service, you cannot re-establish your eligibility.

Q. I contributed to the Veterans Education Assistance Program (VEAP) under Chapter 32 but eventually suspended my contributions. This program was suspended for new enrollments on July 1, 1985. I am still on active duty, can I resume my contributions?

A. Yes. Those who have received refunds of prior Chapter 32 contributions or who have suspended their contributions may reopen their accounts or resume contributions, while on active duty.

Q. I am a World War II veteran with service-connected disabilities. I was released from active service in 1948. Am I eligible for Service-Disabled Veterans Insurance (RH)?

A. No. In order to qualify for Service-Disabled Veterans Insurance (RH) a veteran must have a service-connected disability and have been separated from service under other than dishonorable conditions on or after April 25, 1951.

Q. If I am eligible for Service-Disabled Veterans Insurance (RH), how much time do I have to apply?

A. Applications for RH Insurance must be made within one year from the date that the VA determined that the disability is service-connected.

Q. Is there any restriction on the coverage or type of policy imposed on Service-Disabled Veterans Insurance (RH) applicants?

A. Yes. The maximum amount of National Service Life Insurance (NSLI) and/or U.S. Government Life Insurance is \$10,000. For example, if a veteran eligible for RH Insurance already has \$5,000 of NSLI coverage, then he or she may elect a maximum of \$5,000 RH coverage or a lesser amount in increments of \$500 down to a minimum of \$1,000 coverage. Endowment Plan policies cannot be issued to veterans who are totally disabled.

Duties

Serves as Station Chief of the Geophysical Monitoring for Climatic Change (GMCC) Observatory, South Pole, Antarctica. The GMCC mission is to monitor baseline levels of atmospheric constituents that influence, or are related to, climatic change. A primary goal of the program is to measure the trends and cycles of gases and aerosols over extended periods of 10 and 30 years and to determine the natural and man-made influence on these concentrations and their impact on climate. These activities form part of a larger global network incorporated by the World Meteorological Organization and the United Nations Environmental Program.

The Chief of the South Pole Observatory is responsible for operation, calibration and maintenance of instruments used to monitor trace constituents in the atmosphere. These instruments include a spectrophotometer for total ozone; a photocell oxidant meter for surface detectors; pyranometers and pyrhemometers for solar radiation; an infrared gas analyzer for carbon dioxide; and nephelometer for light scattering properties of atmospheric aerosols.

The officer collects data and analyzes results to identify data anomalies and establish local trends at the observatory. With the station technician, the officer assures proper operation and performance of station monitoring systems. They also test and evaluate new instruments and monitoring methods and make recommendations to the Director, GMCC, for their application at any or all GMCC stations. The officer further performs administrative duties required for normal operation of the station including preparation of periodic tabulation and submission of monthly data and station summary reports to the GMCC office at ERL Headquarters in Boulder, Colorado.

Training and experience in physical science, equivalent to bachelor's degree in atmospheric science, physics, chemistry, or related physical sciences is required. The officer must be able to physically and psychologically work in an isolated environment for an extended period.

Other desired attributes are experience in field measurements of physical parameters of atmospheric or earth science as well as an aptitude for precise laboratory measurements of trace constituents. Experience or training in programming and/or use of micro or mini computer systems would also be desirable.

The usual work environment will be indoors at the South Pole Clean Air Facility. Instrument installation and repairs will be done in the harsh Antarctic environment and requires good physical condition. Logistic support is provided to the U.S. Antarctic Program by the U.S. Navy.

CHAMPUS NEWS

Champus and Wilford Hall Join Forces in Bone Marrow Transplant Test Project
Effective October 1, 1985, persons eligible for CHAMPUS health benefits who need "allogeneic" bone marrow transplant operations are being directed to Wilford Hall Air Force Medical Center, in San Antonio, for tests and evaluation--and possibly for the surgery itself.

Allogeneic transplants are those in which bone marrow to be used for transplant is obtained from a donor.

The new demonstration project enables patients approved for transplants to have the procedures done at Wilford Hall in a centralized management setting at minimal cost. Family members will also receive special assistance with arrangements for transportation and temporary housing.

Wilford Hall has assumed the responsibility for all inpatient medical care and outpatient follow-up related to the transplantation, for patients who require surgery. The Air Force hospital will also evaluate and work up the cases of any patients who have bone marrow surgery done by civilian providers of health care.

Patients who prefer to have the transplantations done by civilian providers will have that option, but they'll still need to make arrangements with Wilford Hall and get letters of authorization from the medical center ahead of time. For these patients, CHAMPUS will share the cost of civilian bone marrow surgery and the attendant care as it presently does. However, CHAMPUS won't help pay for bone marrow transplantation by civilian health care providers unless Wilford Hall has given written authorization before the treatment is received.

It is emphasized that payment of CHAMPUS claims under the program applies only to allogeneic bone marrow transplant procedures. "Autologous" transplants (bone marrow is removed from the patient, treated, then replaced) are still considered to be experimental and will not be paid for by CHAMPUS under any circumstances.

However, Wilford Hall does perform autologous procedures and will consider candidates for this type of bone marrow transplant on a space-available basis at minimal cost to the patient or sponsor.

The Air Force will provide "air evac" transportation for bone marrow patients to Wilford Hall. The medical center will coordinate transportation for both patients and bone marrow donors to and from the San Antonio area.

Wilford Hall will also help patients' families find temporary living quarters in the San Antonio area, when necessary.

In addition, the Air Force facility has established a 24-hour telephone line to the medical center for patients and physicians. The telephone number is (512) 670-7080. The Health Benefits Advisor at Wilford Hall can be reached at (512) 670-6857 or at AUTOVON 554-6857.

The objective of handling bone marrow transplant care at one military medical facility is to see if such centralization can improve the quality of care, while making more efficient use of government health care resources and keeping costs in line.

Defense officials also hope to learn from the 5 year project whether the concept of centralized management can be used with other kinds of treatment.

CHAMPUS to Refigure Rates for Residential Treatment Centers

The Defense Department's CHAMPUS health benefits program is re-computing the rates it pays to the operators of psychiatric residential treatment centers (RTCs) for children and adolescents.

The reevaluation, in response to recommendations by the General Accounting Office and the Defense Audit Service, is part of an effort to establish better control over the amounts, and rates of increase, of the daily rates paid to the centers.

CHAMPUS, which shares the cost of health care for military families, retirees, and surviving family members who cannot get the care they need at service hospitals, has asked each residential treatment center that accepts CHAMPUS assignment to explain the rates it currently charges other customers. From the information received, CHAMPUS will then decide on an appropriate daily rate for each of its participating RTCs.

Daily rates will be determined for each participating RTC. CHAMPUS claims processors will begin paying claims using the new rates on or before January 1, 1986.

VETERANS ADMINISTRATION NEWS

VA Establishing Registry of Spinal Cord-Injured Veterans

The Veterans Administration's Health Services Research and Development Service is in the process of establishing a registry of spinal cord-injured (SCI) veterans that will provide an ongoing data base on each SCI veteran who uses VA's health care system.

Beginning on January 2, 1986, VA medical centers will collect information on all SCI patient visits, including nursing home admissions and discharges, outpatient visits and home-care program patients. Census information will also be gathered on SCI patients who were admitted to but not discharged from VA medical centers before January 2, 1986.

The data collected through the registry will enable VA to study morbidity and mortality patterns, the use of VA services, demographic trends and the history of diseases peculiar to SCI individuals.

In addition, the data will aid VA in planning for the future health care and rehabilitation needs of SCI veteran patients and will make possible the systematic recalling of patients for physical examinations as a form of preventive medicine.

Veterans Job Training Program Extended

The Veterans Administration is notifying more than 200,000 eligible veterans that they have until July 1, 1986, to begin an approved job training program under the Emergency Veterans' Job Training Act (EVJTA).

Congress has extended the deadline to July 1, 1986 for eligible veterans to enter a training program, in an attempt to assist those veterans who were issued EVJTA Certificates of Eligibility, but could not be placed in an approved program of job training prior to the original expiration date.

The program, which pays employers directly to hire and train certain long-term unemployed Vietnam Era and Korean Conflict veterans, has been operational since November 1983. It funds 50 percent of the veteran's starting hourly wages up to \$10,000, to provide a maximum of 15 months of training for certain veterans with service-connected disabilities, and up to 9 months for other participants.

The VA will be mailing letters to these veterans informing them of the extended deadline and asking them to contact the nearest VA Regional Office or Job Service Office.

VA Questions and Answers

Q. Does income from welfare or supplemental Social Security count as income to determine eligibility for a veteran to receive VA disability pension benefits?

A. No, but it should be reported.

Q. I am a veteran with a VA home loan under the Graduated Payment Mortgage Plan. Can I refinance my home with a level-payment VA-guaranteed loan and obtain a lower rate of interest?

A. Yes. Your existing VA Graduated Payment Mortgage may be refinanced with a level-payment-VA guaranteed loan with a lower interest rate. This type of loan is commonly known as an interest-rate-reduction refinance loan.

Q. I am a service-connected disabled veteran rated 20 percent by the VA. Can I receive additional money for my dependents?

A. No. A veteran must be rated 30 percent or higher to receive additional money for dependents.

Q. I entered military service before December 31, 1976, and plan to serve at least 20 years for retirement benefits. Will I lose my GI Bill benefits that expire on December 31, 1989?

A. No. Under the provisions of Public Law 98-525, enacted in 1984, a new GI Bill protects your benefits. Under this law you will receive \$300 per month for 36 months plus one-half of the GI Bill rate you would have received under the noncontributory GI Bill if you start training after December 31, 1989.

Q. Does the VA grant loans to start a business?

A. No. The VA does not offer a business loan. The Small Business Administration has a number of programs designed to assist veterans.

Q. What is a specially-adapted housing grant?

A. A grant not to exceed 50 percent of the cost of building, buying or remodeling a home to meet the needs of seriously disabled, service-connected veterans who are mobility-impaired. The grant cannot exceed \$35,500.

Q. I was injured during World War II, but I never applied for any VA benefits. Is it too late to apply now?

A. No. There is no time limit for filing a claim for VA compensation. If entitlement is established, you would be paid from the first day of the month following the date we received your application. In order to establish entitlement we will need proof that the disability was in fact incurred in or aggravated by your military service.

Q. Why are "points" charged on VA loans?

A. Generally lenders require discount points (a percentage of the loan) when they consider the maximum VA interest rate to be too low to produce the yield or income that other investments would provide. The amount of discount to be paid is a matter of negotiation between the seller and the lender. The VA has no direct control over the charging of points.

Q. My husband died from a service-connected disability and I have not remarried. Is it possible for me to obtain a VA guaranty on a home loan?

A. You would qualify for a Certificate of Eligibility to obtain a VA guaranty on a home loan. Eligibility for the actual loan would be determined by the lender.

FY 86 DEFENSE AUTHORIZATION BILL

The Fiscal Year 1986 Defense Authorization Bill was signed into law (P.L. 99-145) on November 8, 1985.

Several uniformed service benefit provisions contained in the bill are described below. All are retroactive to October 1, 1985, unless stated otherwise.

1. Pay Raise

Basic pay, basic allowance for quarters (BAQ) and basic allowance for subsistence (BAS) are increased by 3 percent.

2. BAQ During Sea Duty

Officers without dependents are now entitled to continue to draw BAQ when the ship they are assigned to is deployed if they were in receipt of BAQ while the ship was in homeport. Previously the BAQ terminated on the 91st day of deployment. Another new provision allows officers without dependents, who are assigned to sea duty under a permanent change of station when the ship is already deployed, to receive BAQ when:

- (a) the officer was in receipt of BAQ at the permanent station from which reporting; and
- (b) the permanent station from which the officer is reporting is the same as the ship's homeport.

3. Authority to Pay BAQ and Variable Housing Allowance (VHA) in Advance

BAQ and VHA may be paid in advance. This is a discretionary payment method, which will be used primarily in connection with a permanent change-of-station (PCS). This payment will not be implemented until the uniformed services have developed appropriate procedures.

4. Elimination of VHA Windfall

An officer's VHA entitlement will be reduced by one-half of the amount by which BAQ plus VHA exceed the actual housing costs of the officer. The provision will be effective March 1, 1986. Examples are provided with this Bulletin.

5. VHA for Certain Officers Paying Child Support

Officers who are not residing in Government quarters and are receiving BAQ at the with-dependents rate solely on the basis of child support payment (court ordered or otherwise) will now receive VHA at the without-dependents rate. This is retroactive to October 1, 1985. However, such officers, who on September 30, 1985, were receiving VHA at the with-dependents rate shall continue to receive VHA at the with-dependents rate until their next permanent change-of-station.

6. VHA in Alaska and Hawaii

Officers assigned to Alaska and Hawaii will be paid VHA rather than rent-plus. This provision was effective November 8, 1985. However, officers already receiving rent-plus on that date may continue to receive rent-plus until the earlier of:

- (a) the date of the officer's next permanent change-of-station; or
- (b) 4 years from the date of bill enactment.

7. Increase in Family Separation Allowance (FSA II)

FSA II rate is increased to \$60 per month for family separation allowances payable for months beginning on or after October 1, 1985.

8. Career Sea Pay

Career sea pay may now be paid to officers at O-1 and O-2 who have completed 3 years of sea duty. Rates are increased for officers with over 14, 16, 18 and 20 years of sea duty.

9. Increase in Dislocation Allowance

Dislocation allowance is increased to equal 2 months of BAQ for qualifying moves begun after September 30, 1985.

10. Travel Allowances

The PCS monetary allowance in lieu of transportation (MALT) is changed (decreased) to conform to civilian allowances as follows:

(a) 1 person	-	15 cents/mile
(b) 2 people	-	17 cents/mile
(c) 3 people	-	19 cents/mile
(d) 4 or more people	-	20 cents/mile

However, payment of flat rate per diem to dependents on a permanent change-of-station is now authorized in addition to MALT as follows:

(a) Officer	-	\$50/day
(b) Spouse	-	\$37.50/day
(c) Each dependent age 12 and over	-	\$37.50/day
(d) Each dependent under age 12	-	\$25.00/day

11. Temporary Lodging Expenses (TLE)

TLE is payable to an officer for a change of permanent station when the officer and the officer's dependents occupy temporary quarters incident to the permanent change of station. TLE maximum payment is \$440 (\$110 maximum per day, not to exceed 4 days).

Rates are: Sponsor - NTE \$50/day
Dependents age 12 and over - NTE \$37.50/day
Dependents under age 12 - NTE \$25.00/day

Instructions for claims will be enclosed in PCS Packets.

12. Parking Fees

Reimbursement for parking fees incurred in connection with local travel is now authorized.

13. Variable Housing Allowance (VHA) Increase

Although not in Public Law 99-145, VHA is increased an average of 5.24 percent.

Elimination of VHA Windfall

EXAMPLES

Actual Housing Costs are: Mortgage or rent payment plus a predetermined Utility/Maintenance Cost.

Assume three officers of the same grade are serving in the same locality and assume BAQ of \$500, VHA of \$200 for simplicity.

BAQ	\$500
VHA	<u>\$200</u>
Total	\$700

OFFICER A:

Total BAQ & VHA	\$700
Less Actual Housing Cost	<u>\$800</u>
	(-) \$100
Entitlement: 500 (BAQ) + 200 (VHA) =	\$700

OFFICER B:

Total BAQ & VHA	\$700
Less Actual Housing Cost	<u>\$600</u>
Excess Housing Cost	\$100
Entitlement: 500 (BAQ) + [200-100/2 (VHA)] =	\$650

OFFICER C:

Total BAQ & VHA	\$700
Less Actual Housing Cost	<u>\$300</u>
Excess Housing Cost	\$400
Entitlement: 500 (BAQ) + [200-400/2 (VHA)] =	\$500

(Officer C will receive a BAQ of \$500 and a VHA of \$0 for a total of \$500.)

SGLI INCREASE

Legislation to increase Servicemen's Group Life Insurance coverage from \$35,000 to \$50,000 effective January 1, 1986 was signed into law (P.L. 99-166) on December 3, 1985. The premium cost remains at 8¢ monthly for each \$1000 worth of coverage; thus \$50,000 worth of SGLI will cost \$4 monthly.

All officers are automatically covered for the full \$50,000 unless they elect to (1) reduce coverage in \$10,000 increments (\$40,000, \$30,000, \$20,000 or \$10,000) or (2) cancel SGLI coverage. Any past elections for reduced coverage or for no coverage made prior to December 3, 1985, are now void. Officers desiring to reduce or cancel SGLI coverage must complete VA Form 29-8286, obtainable from NC1.

SOCIAL SECURITY-MEDICARE TAXES INCREASE

The base upon which social security-medicare taxes will be figured for 1986 is \$42,000, an increase of \$2400 over the 1985 base of \$39,600. The combined social security-medicare tax rate on an officer's wages for 1986 will be 7.15 percent. Accordingly, the maximum amount of social security-medicare tax payable by an officer in 1986 will be \$3,003.

CHAMPUS NEWS

Claims Mailing Address Changes for Champus' Five-State Southeast Region

There will be a change in the claims mailing address for CHAMPUS' Southeast Region, effective December 2, 1985. Claims from the five states in the region--Alabama, Florida, Georgia, Mississippi and Tennessee--should now be sent to: Blue Cross-Blue Shield of South Carolina, P.O. Box 100502, Florence, S.C. 29501-0502.

Also going to the same mailing address will be claims from Puerto Rico, Bermuda, Canada, Central and South America, Mexico and the West Indies.

Effective January 1, 1986, the same mailing address will also be used for claims from CHAMPUS' Southwest Region, consisting of California, Nevada, Arizona and New Mexico. The toll-free telephone number for the Southeast and Southwest Regions is: 1-800-334-0308. There are no toll-free numbers for the listed areas outside the Continental U.S.

File Champus Claims Before End of December - The year-end filing deadline for CHAMPUS claims is almost here. This means that service families--and civilian providers of care--have only until December 31, 1985, to file claims with CHAMPUS for civilian health care received (or provided) in 1984. If you received or provided care in 1985, you have until the end of 1986 to file for cost-sharing of those medical bills.

Remember: If you received (or provided) care in 1984 and haven't filed a claim with CHAMPUS yet, your claim must be in the hands of your state's claims processor by December 31 of this year. Keep in mind that the claim is filed with the processor who serves the state in which you received (or provided) care. If you don't know where to send the claim, contact the Health Benefits Advisor at the nearest military installation for more information.

Claims Processor May Send You New "Liability" Form - As you may have read, CHAMPUS has a new form that is used along with the regular claim form if it appears that another person might be responsible for your injury or illness. It's the CHAMPUS Form 691 (Statement of Personal Injury--Possible Third Party Liability). The form allows the CHAMPUS claims processor to evaluate the circumstances of your accident or injury and decide whether another party might be liable for payment of some or all of the costs of your care.

The claims processor will review your accident- or injury-related claim and decide if there may be third-party involvement. Then, you'll get a Form 691 in the mail, along with a request to fill it out and return it as soon as possible. Your claim won't be processed until the processor receives the form. If you haven't sent the form back within 35 days, the processor will deny your claim.

If you want to, you can (but you don't have to) get a copy of the Form 691 from your nearest Health Benefits Advisor and mail it in at the same time as you send in your claim. This will speed up the whole process.

Health Benefits Advisors at military activities may request supplies of the Form 691 through their services' publication distribution channels. If you don't have a copy of the Form 691, and want to go ahead and submit it with the claim instead of waiting for the processor to send it to you, contact your nearest HBA or your claims processor for assistance.

VETERANS ADMINISTRATION NEWS

A VA Reminder to Pensioners

Certain recipients of Veterans Administration benefits must submit Eligibility Verification Reports (EVR) by January 1, 1986, to avoid interruption or suspension of their benefits, according to the VA in Washington, D.C. Completion of the form is required by law.

Approximately 800,000 veterans, surviving spouses, and children receiving VA's "protected" pension, and parents who get Dependency and Indemnity Compensation (DIC) benefits are reminded to submit the required verification.

EVRs were mailed to these individuals on October 1 in the first phase of a change in VA's income reporting procedures. The EVR replaces the old Annual Income Questionnaire which used to go to all VA pensioners at the same time. The VA is now cycling income reports throughout the year.

Beginning December 1, and running through September 1, 1986, EVRs will be mailed to the nearly 700,000 recipients of VA "improved" pensions at a rate of 70,000 a month.

In all cases, the VA encourages an early return of the form to avoid last minute processing bottlenecks.

VA Questions and Answers

Q. I am receiving VA compensation and claim my 16-year old daughter as a dependent. My daughter is going to have a child next month. Will I be able to claim the child as a dependent on my award?

A. No. Your daughter's child cannot be considered your dependent for VA purposes.

Q. My father is 68-years old and a World War II veteran. How would he go about applying for domiciliary care?

A. VA domiciliaries provide care on an ambulatory self-care basis for veterans disabled by age or disease who are not in need of skilled nursing home services or hospitalization. Applications may be made at any VA office. Prior approval is needed for admission.

Q. I am the widow of a veteran who died 5-years ago. Can I still apply for a widow's pension?

A. Yes. There is no time limit.

Q. What portion of a home loan is covered by the VA guarantee?

A. The VA guarantees 60 percent of the loan up to a maximum of \$27,500 or up to the amount of a veteran's available entitlement.

Q. I am not a veteran but I would like to purchase a repossessed VA home. Is this possible?

A. Yes. Repossessed VA homes are available for the general public to purchase. A listing of such repossessed homes is available at your local VA Regional Office.

Q. I am a 65-year-old World War II veteran. Do I automatically qualify for a nonservice-connected pension?

A. No. A veteran must meet certain military discharge and length-of-service requirements. In addition, the veteran's income cannot exceed certain limitations. At the present time the annual income limitation is \$5,886 for a veteran without dependents and \$7,710 for a veteran with a dependent. The limit increases by \$999 for each additional dependent.
