

A Guide to Aquatic Field Study Sites in South Carolina

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
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Introduction to this Guide


Aquatic habitats, both fresh and salt water, abound in our coastal state of South Carolina. Several major rivers flow from the upstate and empty freshwater into some of the most productive estuaries in the Nation. The state's 200 miles of coastline, encompassing dozens of beautiful barrier islands, beaches, and more than 500,000 acres of coastal marshlands, serve many important ecological and economic functions. These aquatic resources are also excellent places to explore and study.

This guide is designed to help people locate and more effectively utilize the state's aquatic resources for educational purposes. It is primarily designed for educators but can be used by anyone interested in exploring and learning more about aquatic ecosystems.

The guide contains three important sections in addition to this one: "Planning an Effective Field Study," with guidelines for maximizing the outdoor learning experience; "Aquatic Field Study Sites," with specific information about places around the state by region; and, a "Resources" section which includes field guides, curriculum materials, agencies and other resources useful in studies of South Carolina's aquatic ecosystems.

The aquatic field study sites represented in this guide are grouped alphabetically by the state's three main physiographic regions: the blue ridge or mountain region; the piedmont; and the coastal plain. A few sites in the adjacent states of North Carolina and Georgia are also included. A map showing the general locations of these sites is presented in Figure 1.

The number of places that could be used for aquatic studies is almost limitless, from a stream in the mountains to a tidal creek along the coast. Even a pond behind a school yard could serve as a valuable outdoor classroom. This guide is not intended to be comprehensive of all areas that could be used for aquatic field studies. Rather, it is meant to be used as a starting point to getting your feet wet. The sites listed in this guide represent only those places that responded to a survey that was mailed to over 90 places in South Carolina and neighboring states. It is hoped that many more sites will be added as people use the guide and make suggestions of other places to include in future editions.

Specific information is provided for each study site in the "Aquatic Field Study Site" section. The name, address and phone number of each place are located in the upper right hand corner of the page along with a number which corresponds to the site number on the map in Figure 1. Locations are indicated as well as a list of aquatic habitats and other habitats and special features. Descriptions of educational programs, scheduling procedures, fees and other information on available resources and facilities are also included. The information for each category was generated from survey information provided by contact people from the sites. In some cases, the information provided was more complete than others. Rather than leaving some categories blank in the final publication, we have indicated those areas for which no information was provided. For example, if no information was provided for the category "Restrictions," it will read, "No Restrictions Listed" in the guide. We do not know whether the place has no restrictions or just decided not to list them. For this reason, and the fact that many places may change their programs, scheduling prodedures, and fees periodically, we strongly recommend that you contact the places that you are interested in visiting to obtain the most up-to-date information. In other words, use this guide as a starting point to locate some possible places for an aquatic field study and then do some research on your own to determine those places that will best meet your interests and needs.

A checklist of available resources, facilities and aquatic habitats for each site is presented in Figure 2. It is hoped that this checklist will help you quickly identify some areas that might meet your interests and needs. After identifying places from Figure 2, we recommend scanning the descriptive information for those sites in the "Aquatic Field Study Sites" section and calling those places in which you are most interested.

Have fun exploring and learning more about our state's rich aquatic resources!

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Planning an



Planning an Effective Field Study

Careful planning is the key to a successful and safe field study. Several guidelines are offered in this section to help you plan a worth-while field experience. A sample field study checklist that summarizes the recommendations described below is included to facilitate the planning and evaluation process. Please use these recommendations as guidelines only and modify them to meet your own specific needs and situation.

Field Study Procedures

Before the Study - Most of the work necessary for an effective field study needs to take place before you and your students visit the outdoor site. Recommended steps include:

- 1. Visit the site, if possible, to become thoroughly familiar with the area, what resources are available, and to identify potential hazards. This guide provides basic information about the listed sites but it is still necessary for the leader to gain first-hand knowledge of the area before accepting responsibility for students in the field.
- 2. Define the purpose and student learning objectives for the study, including the concepts and skills you want the students to gain.
- 3. Make all necessary arrangements including:
 - a. Obtain permission from appropriate school district personnel to conduct the study. Be sure to highlight the educational objectives. Also, check on the district's liability policy for field studies and what forms are required for each student.
 - b. Contact resource people at the site to schedule a date and time and determine costs for specific activities.
 - c. Arrange for transportation (buses, volunteer drivers, etc.) and determine transportation costs.
 - d. Determine total costs for the study (including transporta-

- tion, registration fees, meals, overnight accommodations, etc.) and a way to cover the costs (student fees, PTA funds, special fund drive, etc.)
- e. Inform parents of the field study plans including purposes, an itinerary with departure and return dates, times and places, recommended clothing and supplies, costs, emergency phone numbers, etc. Also, obtain permission slips, emergency medical information and any other required forms from the parents or guardians of each student.
- f. Line up adult volunteers to assist with the study (recommend at least 1 adult per 10 students) and be sure to inform them of their responsibilities beforehand.
- g. Notify appropriate school personnel (principal, other teachers, cafeteria staff, etc.) of field study schedule and who will be involved so they can plan accordingly.
- 4. Prepare the students for the study:
 - a. Review objectives and provide background information on the area to be visited and conduct appropriate learning activities. Some places provide field study guides that include recommended pre-study activities.
 - b. Discuss appropriate clothing and supplies.
 - c. Discuss plans for meals and any cash students will need or might want to bring.
 - d. Establish an environmental ethics policy for the study. The students could help develop this policy which might include such things as no littering, leaving the area as it was found, no picking of plants or taking of live animals. The leader should also be aware of any local or state regulations pertaining to the area and its flora and fauna (see annotated bibliography section for address of SC Wildlife and Marine Resources Department that regulates wildlife and issues collecting permits.)
 - e. Develop and discuss safety procedures and precautions that should be taken to avoid potential hazards or unpleasant situations (bitting insects, ticks, chiggers, poisonous snakes, oysters, strong currents, etc.)
 - f. Develop a student field study guide containing study objec-

tives, procedures, and any student activities that are to be completed before, during and after the study. A study guide can greatly enhance the learning experience for the students.

5. Prepare the other adult leaders for the study so they know what is expected of them. They should receive the same information that is sent to parents and handed out to the students as well as any special materials developed for them.

During the Study - The field study will have more lasting value if the leaders help the students make discoveries on their own. This does not mean turning the group loose to run wild. Rather, the leader provides opportunities for students to explore and make observations and inferences in a controlled setting. Recommended strategies for leaders to employ during the field study include:

- 1. Encourage students to participate in all field activities.
- 2. Facilitate discovery learning as much as possible.
- 3. Allow for student-generated questions and discussions.
- 4. Help students stay on task but also be open to spontaneous, unexpected learning situations.
- 5. Be sensitive to the students energy levels, interests and physical needs and adjust schedule accordingly.
- 6. Maintain control in a friendly, supportive manner.
- Serve as a good model by demonstrating the high level of enthusiasm and interest you would like your students to share.

After the Study - The value of the field study can be enhanced with follow-up activities back at school. It is also important to thank everyone who helped with the field study experience. Specific post-study recommendations include:

- 1. Send thank you notes to everybody who helped with the study (chaperones, resource people from the study site, etc.)
 Thank yous could be written by the students and/or teacher.
- 2. Review study findings and complete follow-up activities in field study guide.
- Evaluate the effectiveness of the study. Student and teacher evaluations are both helpful in planning more effective studies. More formal evaluations of student knowledge gains might also be desireable.
- 4. Design extension projects utilizing the student's demonstated interests in particular areas.

Resources

This section contains a partial listing of resources, including books and field guides, curriculum materials, resource agencies, and professional organizations. Some of the books and audiovisual materials are probably most useful for planning a field study and preparing pre-study lessons and activities. Field guides, on the other hand, are most useful during the field study. Selected curriculum materials are also included and can provide a working framework for those interested in conducting a study with a group of students.

The books and field guides are grouped by habitat. Because of this arrangement and the fact that there are hundreds of field guides that deal with particular groups of plants or animals, we have only included guides that are habitat or ecosystem-based. The more specific field guides can also be useful when studying an area and the Peterson Field Guide Series and the Golden Guides are excellent resources.

Following each brief description of the resource in the "Books and Field Guides" section is a code in parentheses. "FG" stands for Field Guide, "I" for information source, and "C" for curriculum materials. Some materials may fit more than one category and are so indicated.

Use this annotated list to help you get started with your explorations. You will undoubtedly discover more resources along the way.

Books and Field Guides

Beaches, Esturaries and Salt Marshes

Ballantine, Todd. Tidelands Treasures: A Naturalist's Guide to the Beaches and Salt Marshes of Hilton Head Island. Hilton Head, SC: Deerfield Publishing, Inc., 1983.

General guide with line drawings of common organisms that occur in South Carolina's marsh and beach habitats. (FG)

Coulombe, Deborah A. The Seaside Naturalist: A Guide to Nature Study at the Seashore. Englewood Cliffs, NJ: Prentice-Hall, Inc., 1984.

> Background information and simple line drawings of different groups of marine organisms from plants to marine mammals make this an easy to use reference for K-12 classroom studies in marine biology. (I)

Gosner, Kenneth L. A Field Guide to the Atlantic Seashore from the Bay of Fundy to Cape Hatteras. Boston, MA: Houghton Mifflin Co., 1979.

The most common marine and estuarine species that might be encountered are pictured with good color and black and white drawings. (FG)

Leatherman, Stephen P. Barrier Island Handbook. College Park, MD: University of Maryland, 1979.

Informative book on the geologic and ecological characteristics of barrier beaches and problems associated with inhabiting these dynamic areas. (I)

Neal, William et. al. Living with the South Carolina Shore. Durham, NC: Duke University Press, 1984.

Covers the geologic origins of and processes that shape barrier beaches. Specific information pertaining to erosion, progression, and development on South Carolina's beaches is included. (I) Ruppert, Edward and Richard Fox. Seashore Animals of the Southeast. Columbia, SC: University of South Carolina Press, 1988.

Probably the most complete reference and field guide to marine invertebrates that occur in South Carolina. Beautiful color and black and white photographs and line drawings depict the most common invertebrates. Natural history information is also provided. (FG, I)

Schoettle, H.E. Taylor. A Guide to Jekyll Island. Athens, GA: University of Georgia Sea Grant Program.

The title is misleading from the standpoint that this guide can also be used in studies of other barrier islands. Excellent line drawings of common plants and animals that occur in beach and marsh communities on barrier islands make this a useful guide. (FG)

South Carolina Wildlife and Marine Resources Department. Recreational Shellfish Guide. Charleston, SC: SC Wildlife and Marine Resources Dept., 1987.

Informative booklet on the life histories and regulations pertaining to clams, oysters, shrimp and crabs. Recipes also included. (I)

Spitsbergen, Judith M. Seacoast Life: An Ecological Guide to Natural Seashore Communities in North Carolina. Raleigh, NC: NC State Museum of Natural History, 1980.

An easy to follow field guide with line drawings of common plants and animals. Good descriptions of North Carolina's ecological communities which also occur in South Carolina. (FG, I)

Teal, John and Mildred Teal. *Life and Death of the Salt Marsh*. New York, NY: Ballantine Books, 1969.

A classic book on salt marshes that covers the historic uses, ecology, geology, and conservation of these productive saltwater wetlands. (I)

Thomas, M.C. Fossil Vertebrates - Beach and Bank Collecting for Amateurs. Washington, DC: Smithsonian Museum Bookshops, 1968.

Most of the common fossils, including sharks teeth, that can be found on South Carolina's beaches are pictured in this black and white photographic guide. (FG)

Freshwater Ponds, Lakes, and Rivers

Angel, Heather and Pat Wolseley. *The Water Naturalist*. New York, NY: Facts On File, Inc., 1982.

Informative general text with projects that cover freshwater as well as saltwater communities. Even though the authors are from England, the text has general applications and the projects can be easily adapted to local situations. (I, C)

Odum, W.E., T.J. Smith III, J.K. Hoover, and C.C. McIvor. The Ecology of Freshwater Marshes of the United States East Coast: A Community Profile. Washington, DC: US Fish and Wildlife Service, 1984.

> Fairly comprehensive and technical treatment of freshwater marsh ecosystems and their community components. Includes species lists and scientific references. (I)

Reid, G.K., H.S. Zim and G.S. Fichter. *Pond Life*. New York, NY: Golden Press, 1967.

Excellent general guide with color illustrations of common plants and animals that live in ponds. (FG)

Stocker, Daniel G. et. al. *Freshwater Ecology*. Englewood Cliffs, NJ: Prentice Hall, Inc., 1972.

General text that covers ecological characteristics and properties of ponds, lakes, streams and rivers. Includes sampling techniques and field and laboratory studies. (l, C)

Curriculum Materials Containing Field Activities

Allen, Wendy B. and Patty O. McLaughlin. Sea Sampler: Aquatic Activities for the Field and Classroom. Charleston, SC: SC Sea Grant Consortium, 1985.

Elementary (grades K-6) and secondary (grades 7-12) versions of Sea Sampler are available and include original activities and a sampling of activities from a variety of other curriculums that have been successfully used in South Carolina.

Barker, Wells J. A Guide to Field Studies for the Coastal Environment. (Project CAPE Teaching Module) Manteo, NC: Dare County Board of Education, 1981.

Twenty-five physical and earth science activities that can be used in field investigations of coastal environments are described. Topics include wave measurement, tides, dune profiling, salinity and soil sampling.

Activities for field trips to beach, salt marsh, mudflat and jetty communities are included in this unit designed for primary grades.






