



Inclusion

Inclusion: an environment where the Agency leverages diversity to achieve mission goals and business objectives and maximize the potential of individuals and the organization. Additionally, it relies on inclusion as antithetical to exclusion and the concepts of intra- and inter-organizational inclusion.

Inclusive of non-English speakers, undocumented families. Don't want to leave anyone out.

There were some data collection issues with clarity of notes, such as the use of broad statements that donated to quality data collection.





The Nature of Asking/ Offer Heavy/ Knowledge as an Offer


Contribution by date

Atlantic Hurricane Season



PROBLEMS


This domain has the most nodes and quantifies major issues integral to NCIDRs work. Trends in discussion points suggest a value-shift in NCIDRs mission.


Hazard Mention Frequency


This domain categorizes levels of action. Subtle shifts in code frequency suggest a recent focus on longevity and progressive metrics.




NEXT STEPS: REVISED & RELAUNCH SURVEY?
