Renovation on the grounds (completed in 1993) include laboratory and teaching space, office space, lecture and meeting halfs as well as an exhibit center and dormitory. The reserve offers educational tours and field trips for Washburn Island, the South Cape Beach and Waquoit Bay watershed.
